## New national side of euro coins intended for circulation

National side of the new commemorative 2-euro coin intended for circulation and issued by Finland

Euro coins intended for circulation have legal tender status throughout the euro area. The Commission publishes all new euro coin designs with a view to informing all parties required to handle coins in the course of their work as well as the public at large (<sup>1</sup>). In accordance with the Council conclusions of 10 February 2009 (<sup>2</sup>), the Member States and countries that have concluded a monetary agreement with the Community providing for the issuing of euro coins are allowed to issue commemorative euro coins intended for circulation, provided that certain conditions are met, particularly that only the 2-euro denomination is used. These coins have the same technical characteristics as other 2-euro coins, but their national side features a commemorative design that is highly symbolic in national or European terms.

## **Issuing country:** Finland

**Subject of commemoration:** 200th anniversary of the first Diet of Finland and the founding of Central Government Institutions in Finland

**Description of the design:** The inner part of the coin depicts the profile of the Porvoo Cathedral, which was the site of opening of the first Diet of Finland. The date 1809 appears on the top. The year mark 2009 is on the right hand side. The indication of the issuing country 'FI' and the mintmark are on the left hand side.

The coin's outer ring depicts the twelve stars of the European flag.

Number of coins to be issued: 1,6 million

Date of issue: October 2009
