The Commission's initial proposal on rational planning techniques was forwarded to the Council and the Parliament on 14 November 1995. The Commission, on 24 March 1997, submitted an amended proposal (¹), following the opinion of the Parliament adopted on 13 November 1996, which introduced a significant number of amendments proposed by the Parliament.

There was no discussion in the Council on the amended directive under the Dutch presidency. The Luxembourg presidency has, however, included the proposal on the preliminary draft agenda of the Energy Council scheduled for 8 December 1997.

The Commission has forwarded to Parliament the working paper (¹) which estimates the over-compensation paid to cereal producers in relation to the targets of the July 1992 reform at approximately ECU 8 500 million. Since the Commission has opted for a global approach to the matter, this amount should be seen as an order of magnitude rather than a specific figure.
- 2. The Commission has made an overall analysis for the Community as a whole rather than detailed analyses for the Member States or the different types of holdings.
