MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE SITTING OF MONDAY, 7 JULY 1980

IN THE CHAIR: MRS VEIL

President

(The sitting was opened at 5 p.m.)

1. Resumption of session

The President declared resumed the session of the European Parliament adjourned on 27 June 1980.

2. Composition of Parliament — Verification of credentials

The President announced to Parliament that the competent French authorities had informed her that Mr

Maurice Doublet had been appointed member of Parliament to replace Mr Messmer, who had resigned.

The President welcomed the new member and pointed out that, pursuant to Rule 3 (3), any member whose credentials had not yet been verified provisionally took his seat in Parliament and on its committees with the same rights as other members.

On a proposal from the Bureau, made pursuant to Rule 3 (1), Parliament ratified the mandates of Mr Vitale and

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Mr Fanton, whose appointments had been announced on 26 June 1980 (*see item 2 of minutes of that date*).

These petitions had been given Nos 34 to 43/80 and had been entered in the register provided for in Rule 48 (2). Pursuant to paragraph 3 of that same Rule, they had been referred to the Committee on the Rules of Procedure and Petitions.

3. Composition of committees

At the request of the Communist and Allies Group, Parliament ratified the appointment of Mr Vitale as member of the Committee on Agriculture to replace Mr Papapietro.

Parliament took note of this information.

The President announced that she had received from the Council certified true copies of the following documents:

- Convention between the European Economic Community and the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine refugees (UNRWA) concerning aid to refugees in the countries of the Near East for 1979 and 1980;
- Agreement in the form of an exchange of letters on the amendment of the Agreement between the European Economic Community and the Swiss Confederation on the application of the rules on Community transit;

- Agreement in the form of an exchange of letters on the amendment of the Agreement between the European Economic Community and the Republic of Austria on the application of the rules on Community transit.

7. Withdrawal of a motion for a resolution

The President announced that Mr Pisani had informed her that he was withdrawing the motion for a resolution which he and other colleagues had tabled on a new common agricultural policy (Doc. 1-800/79) (*see item 4 of minutes of 10 March 1980*).

8. Urgent debate

The President announced that she had received:

- a request from the Council for urgent debate pursuant to Rule 14 in respect of a proposal for a Regulation on the structural problems affecting the United Kingdom and a proposal for a Regulation concerning the financial mechanism (Doc. 1-273/80).

The request for urgent debate was justified by the fact that the Council was due to discuss these proposals at its meeting on 22 July.

- a motion for a resolution from Mr Schieler and others, on behalf of the Socialist Group, Mr Wawrzik and others, on behalf of the Group of the European People's Party (CD Group), and Mrs Agnelli and others, on behalf of the Liberal and Democratic Group, with request for urgent debate pursuant to Rule 14, on aid to refugees in the South China Sea (Doc. 1-284/80).

The reasons supporting this request for urgent debate were contained in the document itself.

She announced that, pursuant to Rule 14 (1), second subparagraph, the vote on these requests for urgent debate would be taken at the beginning of the next day's sitting.

9. Order of business

The President stated that the draft agenda for the present part-session, drawn up by the enlarged Bureau pursuant to Rule 12, had been distributed.

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She announced that, having noted the various problems relating to the present part-session, the enlarged Bureau had decided at its meeting that morning to propose the following adjustments to the agenda:

- the deadline for tabling proposals for total rejection of the new draft general budget of the European Communities for the financial year 1980 was fixed at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, 8 July.

In this connection the enlarged Bureau reminded Parliament that requests to amend the proposals for total rejection could not be submitted in the form of amendments to these proposals but that they should take the form of a proposal for total rejection.

Statements on the proposals for total rejection would be made at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, 9 July and the vote would be held at 3 p.m. on that day.

Speaking time for these statements was allocated as follows:

- three minutes for the authors of the proposals (one author for each proposal),
- five minutes for each political group,
- five minutes in total for the non-attached members.

Mr Pannella spoke.

Parliament agreed to this proposed adjustment to the agenda.

- At the request of the Committee on Transport, the enlarged Bureau proposed that the vote on the Janssen van Raay report (Doc. 1-274/80) be held that evening.

Parliament agreed to this proposal on the understanding that the vote could not be held that evening unless the debate was closed.

- The enlarged Bureau proposed that the debate on the Luster report (Doc. 1-148/80/corr.), which was scheduled for the sitting of Wednesday, 9 July, be placed on the agenda for Tuesday, 8 July after the statement by the Council on the Luxembourg presidency.

The President stated that the rapporteur had already introduced his report in May and that the speaking time proposed for the sitting of Tuesday, 8 July should be

divided by those concerned between the debate on the Council statement and the debate on the Luster report.

The President announced that she had received from Mr Blaney, Mr Pannella and Mr Bonde, on behalf of the Group for the Technical Coordination and Defence of Independent Groups and Members, a proposed amendment to the agenda pursuant to Rule 12 (2), seeking:

- to remove from the agenda the debate on the Luster report (Doc. 1-148/80/corr.),
- if this proposal was rejected, not to apply Rule 28 to the debate on the Luster report.

The following spoke: Mr Blaney, Mr Fanti, on behalf of the Communist and Allies Group, Mr D'Angelosante and Mr Pannella.

Parliament rejected the request to remove the debate on the Luster report from the agenda.

Parliament rejected the request that Rule 28 should not be applied to the debate on the Luster report.

Parliament agreed to the proposal to place the debate on the Luster report on the agenda for the sitting of Tuesday, 8 July.

- The enlarged Bureau proposed to organize the sitting of Wednesday, 9 July as follows:

- motion for a resolution by Mr Rinsche, Mr Janssen van Raay, Mr Jonker, Mr Cottrell, Mrs Kellett-Bowman, Mr Spicer, Mr De Clercq, Mr Haagerup, Mr Wawrzik, Mrs von Alemann, Mr Brok, Mr Prag, Mrs Agnelli, Mr Bettiza, Mr Irmer, Mr Damseaux, Mrs Dekker, Mr Baudis, Mr Cecovini, Mr Berkhouwer, Mr Majonica, Mr van Aerssen, Mr Bocklet, Mr Früh, Mr Travaglini, Mr Penders, Mr Blumenfeld, Mr Mertens and Mrs Lenz, on the border incident between Vietnamese troops from Cambodia and Thai troops in Thailand (Doc. 1-312/80).

More than 21 members rose in support of Mr Balfe's request.

Referring to Rule 35 (6), the President decided that the electronic voting system would be used for this vote and for all other roll-call votes which might be requested.

Mr Blaney requested, on behalf of the Group for the Technical Coordination and Defence of Independent Groups and Members, roll-call votes on Rules 26 and 31A as amended and on the motion for a resolution as a whole, pursuant to Rule 35 (4).

A roll-call vote was taken on Rule 26 as amended using the electronic voting system.

Result of the vote:

- for: 181,
- against: 62.

Rule 26 in its amended form was not adopted as it failed to secure the votes of the majority of Members of Parliament, which at Parliament's current membership was 205 votes.

The President announced that there was no reason to vote on Rule 31A as Rule 26 had not been amended.

She also announced that there was no longer any reason to vote on the motion for a resolution as it no longer contained any proposed amendments.

Parliament adopted paragraph 1 and then paragraphs 2 and 3.

On paragraph 4, Mr Scott-Hopkins, Lady Elles and Mr Hopper, on behalf of the European Democratic Group, had tabled amendment No 2 seeking to replace the text of this paragraph with a new text.

The rapporteur spoke.

Amendment No 2 was rejected.

Parliament adopted paragraph 4 and then paragraphs 5 to 10.

On paragraph 11, Mr Scott-Hopkins, Lady Elles and Mr Hopper, on behalf of the European Democratic Group, had tabled amendment No 3 seeking to replace the text of this paragraph with a new text.

The rapporteur spoke.

Amendment No 3 was rejected.

Parliament adopted paragraph 11 and then paragraphs 12 to 14.

On paragraph 15, Mr Scott-Hopkins, Lady Elles and Mr Hopper, on behalf of the European Democratic Group, had tabled amendment No 4 seeking to replace the text of this paragraph with a new text.

The rapporteur spoke.

Amendment No 4 was adopted.

Parliament adopted paragraphs 16 and 17.

On paragraph 18, Mr Scott-Hopkins, Lady Elles and Mr Hopper, on behalf of the European Democratic Group, had tabled amendment No 5 (withdrawn).

Parliament adopted paragraphs 18 to 20.

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

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RESOLUTION

on the economic development of the Community in the first half of 1980 and the implementation of the Council's Decision on convergence

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the communication from the Commission to the Council (COM(80) 100 final and COM(80) 101 final),
- having regard to the economic development of the Community in the first half of 1980,
- having regard to the following trends noted by the Commission in the Community as a whole, although to a differing degree in the various Member States:
 - (a) distinct acceleration of inflation,
 - (b) deceleration of growth,
 - (c) increasing unemployment,
 - (d) rising consumer prices,
 - (e) a further rise in energy prices because of continuing sharp increases in crude oil prices,
 - (f) insufficient investment growth following years of under-investment,
 - (g) a deteriorating competitive situation *vis-à-vis* third countries,
 - (h) a widening gap between the economies of Member States,
 - (i) public sector deficits remaining ominously high,
 - (j) a deterioration in the balance of trade not only as a result of oil prices,
 - (k) continuing coverage — for the time being — of the deficit on current account by running down currency reserves,
 - (l) a further increase in the balance of payments deficit,
 - (m) the Commission's assessment — scarcely a confident one — of the outlook for 1981, which is at present clouded by a number of imponderables,
- having regard to the report of the Committee on Economic and Monetary Affairs (Doc. 1-288/80),

1. Notes that particularly where the economy is concerned, the Member States of the European Community have been and still are living beyond their means;
2. Maintains the basic points it made in its opinion on the Commission's report on the economic situation in 1979 and the outlook for 1980;
3. Stresses that failing greater monetary stability, neither the growth essential to full employment nor the conditions necessary for external economic equilibrium can be secured;
4. Regrets that, despite the Council Decision of 18 February 1974, neither the unfavourable developments within the Community nor the changes in world economic indicators, which for years have been going against the Community, have prompted the governments represented in the Council to create the necessary decision-making structures

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or at least to grasp the opportunities offered by the Treaty for effective measures by majority decision;

5. Considers that the previously established coordination and consultation procedures in the area of economic policy are an inadequate response by the Community to the changing world economic situation; calls on the Commission to carry out the task of improving the coordination procedures as urged by Parliament in points 13 and 15 of its resolution of 17 November 1978 ⁽¹⁾;

6. Finds specific support for this view in the fact that the Community has so far been unable to decide on a coordinated energy policy and on effective energy saving measures and to develop the necessary capital market strategy to recycle the OPEC surpluses created by higher oil prices;

7. Considers that the political, economic and social disparities threatening the Community can be reduced only by decision-making structures that will more effectively meet the Community's objectives; that the Council, by doing nothing to deal with what is the most urgent task of all, will be left with the full responsibility for the further crises which will inevitably hit the Community;

8. Calls for more intensive consultations between Council and Commission and between these two institutions and Parliament on economic policy matters; deplores that the Commission has not yet complied with points 16 and 19 of its resolution ⁽²⁾ calling for an improvement in the procedure for consulting the European Parliament;

9. Strongly criticizes the fact that the Council is apparently not even willing to take measures to secure the objectives laid out in the preambles ⁽³⁾ to its own decision on the attainment of a high degree of convergence of economic policies ⁽⁴⁾ and to its Directive on stability, growth and full employment in the Community ⁽⁵⁾;

10. Calls for fuller implementation of the directive on stability, growth and full employment and more effective cooperation between governments and the social partners;

11. Requests that the Commission submit a report stressing the drastic effect which index-linking has had on prices in some Member States;

12. Requests that the Commission submit to the Council a review of the political situation pointing out the consequences in the last 10 years of the dilatory way it has set about achieving virtually all, and not simply the economic, objectives laid out in the Treaties;

13. Requests that in conjunctural and structural policy the Commission make full use of the opportunities afforded by the Treaty for short and medium-term measures;

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14. Calls on the Commission to state specifically in its annual report on the 1980 economic situation and the outlook for 1981 what steps it can take to exert a positive influence on short-term economic developments;
15. Requests the Commission and Council to seek the views of, and involve more closely, the European Parliament when taking decisions under Article 103 of the EEC Treaty in relation to conjunctural policies;
16. Calls for a new, comprehensive, medium-term economic programme which takes into account the radically altered situation since 1976;
17. Warns against considering the European Monetary System as a secure achievement and stresses the point made in the Ruffolo report, that unless a central, largely autonomous authority (Monetary Fund) is soon set up, the European Monetary System cannot fulfil its purpose in the long run;
18. Calls on the Commission to realize that, in addition to observing and commenting on short and medium-term economic developments, its essential task is to put forward proposals that are not simply suited to what is politically expedient at the time, but properly designed to create an integrated market for the free movement of capital, goods and services under equal conditions of competition, thus creating one of the main conditions for completely free movement of persons;
19. Considers that the above requirements are borne out by the Commission's diagnosis of the 1980 economic situation approved by Parliament;
20. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Council and Commission and to the governments and parliaments of the Member States.

10. Development of an air traffic control system (vote)

The next item was the vote on the motion for a resolution contained in the report by Mr Janssen van Raay (Doc. 1-274/80).

Sir Peter Vanneck gave an explanation of vote.

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

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RESOLUTION

on the development of a coordinated European air traffic control system

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the motion for a resolution tabled by Mr Berkhouwer (Doc. 1-554/79),
- having regard to its previous resolutions ⁽¹⁾ and reports on the promotion of efficient air traffic control (Doc. 49/78 and Doc. 106/79),
- having regard to the report of the Committee on Transport (Doc. 1-274/80),

1. Regrets to note that, despite its numerous initiatives on European aviation policy and a European approach to management and control of air traffic, there has been no increase in intra-European cooperation and there is now a trend towards 'renationalization';

2. Draws attention in this context to Eurocontrol, which is threatened by a more or less radical erosion of its powers and even, perhaps, dismantlement;

3. Recalls that Eurocontrol is the only European organization with executive functions in a specific field, namely active air traffic control, the quality of which is, moreover, undisputed;

4. Notes with regret that the difficulties concerning Eurocontrol and the threat to its future are due solely to a lack of political will and a resurgence of national egoism;

5. Points out that, although air transport today is characterized by a relatively high level of safety, everything possible must be done to reduce the dangers and risks of aviation without delay, and stresses here the suggestions and recommendations it has already formulated on the subject;

6. Notes that, because of the compartmentalization of the already limited Western European air space and the lack of cooperation and coordination between national air traffic services, air traffic in Western Europe displays a number of serious shortcomings;

7. Draws particular attention to:

- (a) the disturbing underutilization of capacity of the air traffic control systems;
- (b) needless overburdening of air traffic control staff and services and air crew;
- (c) all too frequent congestion with the resultant disruption, diversions and delays for air traffic and inconvenience for passengers;
- (d) unsatisfactory coordination between military and civil air traffic;

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- (e) frequent incompatibility of expensive air traffic control apparatus and equipment;
 - (f) unjustifiable increases in costs and waste of money and fuel;
8. Is firmly convinced that these deficiencies can be relieved or removed only by far-reaching cooperation and coordination between the various national air navigation authorities in the management and control of air traffic;
 9. Proposes to this end the setting-up of an integrated European system for the management of air traffic flows, to be responsible in particular for the tactical and strategic planning of air traffic;
 10. Ask that this task be entrusted to Eurocontrol;
 11. Considers it desirable that for active air traffic control a similar integrated system be introduced involving the Eurocontrol Agency;
 12. Considers it necessary therefore that Eurocontrol continue its operational tasks in the upper airspace of Belgium, the Federal Republic of Germany and Luxembourg, that the Netherlands fulfil its obligation to transfer control to Eurocontrol, that, with the accession of Italy and Denmark in prospect, negotiations with these countries be intensified and that France, Ireland, Italy and the United Kingdom give favourable consideration to transferring these tasks to the Agency;
 13. Believes that, if there is not sufficient political will to achieve this in the immediate future, the Eurocontrol Convention which expires in 1983 ought to be prolonged automatically in its present form so that at least the air traffic control centres of Eurocontrol at Maastricht and Karlsruhe can be maintained;
 14. Considers that such an extension should be made use of for the execution, at the Commission's expense, of a basic study of the relationship between the development of a common air transport policy and an integrated air traffic control system; believes, moreover, that this study needs to be geared to the future, based on a cost-benefit analysis and drawn up in consultation with the sectors concerned;
 15. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Council and the Commission, to the competent authorities in Eurocontrol's member States and to the chairmen of the appropriate committees in the national parliaments.

11. Restructuring of the steel industry (debate)

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RESOLUTION

on

- I. the communication from the Commission on the social aspects of the restructuring of the steel industry and
- II. the revised draft of a Commission Decision concerning the creation of special temporary allowances to assist workers in the iron and steel industry under the Community restructuring plan

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the communication from the Commission to the Council on the social aspects of the restructuring of the steel industry (COM(79) 199 final),
 - having regard to the revised draft of a Commission Decision concerning the creation of special temporary allowances to assist workers in the iron and steel industry under the Community restructuring plan (COM(79) 436 final),
 - having regard to the resolution of 6 July 1979 of the ECSC Consultative Committee,
 - having regard to the interim report of the Committee on Social Affairs and Employment (Doc. 1-465/79),
 - having regard to the motion for a resolution tabled by Ms Clwyd and others on the British steel industry (Doc. 1-836/79),
 - having regard to the motion for a resolution tabled by Mr Rogers and others on the steel industry in Wales (Doc. 1-8/80),
 - having regard to the report of the Committee on Social Affairs and Employment (Doc. 1-215/80),
1. Points with concern to the serious effects on the labour market since 1974 of surplus production capacity in the iron and steel sector combined with a decline in demand, which cannot be offset by increased exports because of the worldwide economic crisis and the welcome progress made by the developing countries;
 2. Expresses its regret at the absence of action and provisions on the part of the Community, although the Commission was aware of the foreseeable development of steel production and markets; expresses its regret that the existing Community instruments for an active employment policy cannot be satisfactorily deployed as there is too little money in the relevant funds and the Council's position on this point has not been made sufficiently clear;
 3. Regrets the fact that the absence of a consistent industrial policy is leading to the phasing-out of a large proportion of production capacity, thereby causing a significant reduction in the number of jobs available; further notes that the rapid restructuring taking place in the steel industry throughout the Community is causing considerable loss of jobs in other industries as well as in iron and steel;
 4. Draws particular attention to the position of workers in the iron and steel industry which is already precarious and which is made more difficult by the fact that in certain steel-producing areas there is practically no scope for reconversion;
 5. Regrets that the necessary restructuring of the steel industry in certain Member States was delayed, thus increasing the danger of accelerated closures;

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6. Points out that national measures which hitherto were mainly concerned with ensuring the economic viability of undertakings, were able to achieve quite considerable successes in terms of restructuring without serious social repercussions in the periods of economic prosperity in the sixties and early seventies in some Member States, since alternative (substitute) jobs were available in other sectors of the economy;
7. Points out that in the present situation a rational employment policy is possible only if there is an active regional development policy; this policy should be worked out, financed and implemented by the Member States and by the Community institutions;
8. Points out that the aid available under Article 56 (2) (b) of the ECSC Treaty, which within the restricted scope of this provision is effective, provides only social assistance on loss of jobs;
9. Stresses that, in addition to the creation of new jobs, which is necessary for social and economic reasons, priority must be given to maintaining existing employment, and that therefore full use should continue to be made of Article 56 (2) (b), while noting that these measures are far from adequate;
10. Supports therefore the measures proposed by the Commission in the revised draft decision, which go beyond the usual ECSC provisions:
 - (a) early retirement,
 - (b) restrictions on overtime,
 - (c) improvements in conditions and duration of work,
 - (d) new patterns of shiftwork;
11. Emphasizes that the proposed measures must have a favourable impact on employment opportunities without harming company competitiveness, the restoration or, as appropriate, improvement of which is essential in order to maintain as many jobs as possible;
12. Considers it important that the early retirement measures proposed should actually benefit the workers, for example, so that the unemployment aid granted under Article 56 (2) (b) is not subject to a means test and that early retirement does not in the final analysis represent a form of concealed redundancy;
13. Takes the view that the proposed age limit of 55 for early retirement must be extended to all European workers in the iron and steel industry on a voluntary basis and that it needs to be made much more flexible for workers with particularly arduous jobs, and urges that the three-year period for which the allowances are granted should be extended in future;
14. Advocates the elimination of structural and temporary overtime by means of a uniform Community Regulation which must also ensure that minimum wages are adjusted; advocates, therefore, the elimination of systematic overtime by means of a uniform Community Regulation which must at the same time provide for progressive increases in the lowest salaries, and recommends that the Commission investigate to what extent these measures may be monitored or controlled via the systems for recording or approving overtime which are required in most countries of the Community;
15. Proposes that in so far as additional Community funds can be made available, allowances for improvements in conditions and duration of work be granted to workers

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whose working time is reduced with a view to enabling redundancies caused by partial or complete closure of an undertaking to be spread over a period of time ⁽¹⁾, although the actual form of implementation must be a matter for negotiations;

16. Calls for new patterns of shift work, principally by Regulations providing for extra rest shifts for older workers and those with particularly arduous jobs;

17. Expresses its concern at the fact that, in addition to older workers, young people are affected by restructuring or fail to find alternative training places or opportunities for rehabilitation in single-industry areas, and requests that vocational training, retraining and further training programmes, as well as worker mobility should receive more Community assistance;

18. Calls on both the Governments of the Member States and the Commission to do their utmost to ensure that industrial redevelopment is carried out in the areas affected by the restructuring of the steel industry and to this end requests the Commission to lay before the Council without delay a plan of action as part of a European industrial policy;

19. Notes that the measures proposed together constitute a package of measures eligible for aid, to be combined and implemented in line with national and regional requirements;

20. Points out that these measures do not preclude national social aid programmes but require a contractual guarantee to the Community from national governments for 50 or 25 % of the financing of any given programme;

21. Considers that neither the European Institutions nor the national governments are entitled to decide the framework within which the two sides of industry are to operate and conclude agreements i.e. all possible forms of restructuring should be offered at European level so as to provide the negotiating parties with the optimum scope for combinations of whichever measures are appropriate in the circumstances;

22. Strongly condemns the negative attitude of the Council;

23. Still supports the Commission proposal that 100 million EUA be entered in the general budget and proposes that, in view of the urgency of the matter, 60 million EUA should be made available in 1981 and 40 million EUA in 1982;

24. Urges that the assistance provided to the Member States by the Community should be granted retrospectively from the date on which the first restructuring measures with social consequences were applied;

25. Instructs its President to forward this resolution and the report of its committee to the Council and Commission.

2. Welcomes the fact that the Commission, in its new budget proposal of 29 February 1980 for the 1980 financial year, has now, in accordance with Parliament's original demands, classified contributions to the ECSC as non-compulsory expenditure;

3. Acknowledges that the Commission has now taken a vital step in the right direction in proposing that the amount of the contributions envisaged should be determined under the annual budgetary procedure.

embodying the opinion of the European Parliament on the proposal from the Commission of the European Communities to the Council for a Directive on a special Community certification procedure for industrial products originating in third countries

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the proposal from the Commission to the Council ⁽¹⁾,
 - having been consulted by the Council pursuant to Article 100 of the EEC Treaty (Doc. 1-7/80),
 - having regard to the agreement on technical barriers to trade concluded as part of the multilateral GATT negotiations ⁽²⁾,
 - having regard to the Council Decision of 15 January 1980 laying down provisions on the introduction and implementation of technical regulations and standards ⁽³⁾,
 - having regard to the report of the Committee on Economic and Monetary Affairs and the opinion of the Committee on External Economic Relations (Doc. 1-236/80),
1. Welcomes the Agreement on technical barriers to trade concluded within GATT as a contribution to the further development of the policy of free trade which has been a feature of the industrialized countries' trade policy since the Second World War and is an essential precondition of continuing economic growth;
 2. Assumes that the concessions resulting from the GATT agreement are based on the principle of reciprocity, and also agrees therefore to the Community establishing a procedure that guarantees such reciprocity in practice;
 3. Points out that a procedure of this nature should not be used as a means to protect Community manufacturers for a period of time from excessively strong foreign competition; calls on the Commission, therefore, to this end to spell out more clearly some of the provisions of the Directive;
 4. Believes that application of the procedure should be the exception rather than the rule; calls on the Commission therefore to:
 - (a) alter Article 1 (2) from an optional to a compulsory provision;
 - (b) define more closely the product categories to which the procedure will apply;
 5. Emphasizes that it must be the task of the Community and not that of the Member States to ascertain whether reciprocity exists;
 6. Feels it is unnecessary to set up a new committee when one committee has already been set up in the Community with the task of implementing the GATT agreement on technical barriers to trade;
 7. Calls for the greatest possible clarity in the rules applicable within the European Community; urges the Commission, therefore, to ensure complete consistency between the proposed Directive and the Council Decision of 15 January 1980, and feels, moreover, that it would be appropriate for all these provisions to be consolidated in one legal act;

1. Approves the broad lines of the Commission report, except on the points set out below, and shares the view implicitly contained in it that at this stage conditions are still not ripe for total integration of railway undertakings at Community level;

Emphasizes that, given their relatively low energy consumption, 'soft' impact on the environment and suitability both to automated technology and combined transport, the railways have a potentially important contribution to make towards the furtherance of the general economic and social objectives of the Community;
 3. Invites the Commission to provide a detailed analysis of the advantages to be derived from increased cooperation among European railway undertakings, and notes that measures must also be taken to counter the distortions of competition which confront the railways, having full regard to Article 80 (2) of the EEC Treaty where it refers to regional policy, on which the Commission is requested to take appropriate measures;
 4. Therefore urges the Commission, in cooperation with the Group of Nine, to undertake further comprehensive studies with a view to:
 - (i) establishing a medium- and long-term programme for the Community railway network, and showing the technical advances and essential infrastructure developments projected over that period;
 - (ii) identifying the particular problems for Community railway undertakings arising from the accession of new Member States;
 5. Requests the Commission to examine possible ways of promoting the coordination of:
 - (a) railway investment and finance within the European Community (also encompassing the possibility of private capital funding of such projects as electrification, inter-city passenger services and intra-Community freight services);
 - (b) the technological advance of railway operations leading to greater operational efficiency;
 - (c) the commercial and operational structures of networks, especially in the goods market (including common goods wagons and tariffs), in order to facilitate cross-frontier traffic;

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- (d) all other areas in which there exists a 'community of interest' among the railway undertakings of the Member States;
6. Considers unacceptable, moreover, that the Commission only intends to report again to the Council 'around 1985' on 'the establishment of common bodies';
7. Calls on the Commission to report back to the European Parliament by the end of 1981 on its conclusions with regard to the promotion of the coordination advocated above, and on the advisability of its submitting a proposal to the Council to this effect;
8. Requests the Commission to inform Parliament of progress achieved hitherto with regard to the implementation of Article 15 (1) and (2) of Council Decision 75/327/EEC of 20 May 1975 concerning the financial balance of railway undertakings and public service obligations;
9. Calls on the Commission to submit a general communication to the Council without delay declaring its intention to initiate progress on Community railway policy, in the light of the above considerations and within the framework of an overall common transport policy designed among other things to achieve the gradual integration of railway undertakings;
10. Instructs its President to forward this resolution and the report of its committee to the Council and Commission.

 - considering that it is important that political control over the implementation of appropriations voted in the budget should be as up-to-date as possible,
 - considering that the analysis of the results of a particular budget provides valuable information for future budgetary decisions,
 - having regard to the report of the Committee on Budgetary Control (Doc. 1-275/80),
1. Is compelled to point out that, during the 1979 financial year,
 - (a) the unsuitability of the administrative structures and the procedures in the Member States again substantially impeded the utilization of payment appropriations in respect of:

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- the Social Fund (Article 500 — agricultural and textile sectors; Article 505 — measures to help women; Chapter 52 — pilot schemes),
 - the Regional Fund (33.1 % of the payment appropriations for the financial year were utilized),
 - certain EAGGF, Guidance Section, measures (Article 811 — cessation of farming; Item 8322 — reorganization of fruit production; Item 8350 — conversion premium (wine sector); Article 853 — citrus fruit),
 - financial and technical cooperation with the non-associated developing countries;
- (b) although there was some improvement with regard to the previous year, the lack of coordination between legislative and budgetary decisions led to substantial carry-overs or cancellations of funds for:
- energy policy (Item 3201 — joint projects in prospecting for hydrocarbons; Article 324 — demonstration projects),
 - the non-quota section of the Regional Fund (no appropriations were utilized),
 - EAGGF, Guidance Section — common measures concerning agricultural infrastructures,
 - measures in the scientific and technical field (Article 362),
 - food aid;
- the Commission must bear particular responsibility for the failure to implement appropriations relating to:
- the reorganization and redevelopment of crisis-hit sectors (Item 3750) (no part of the allocation for the financial year was utilized),
 - the social consequences of industrial conversion (Article 512) (no appropriations were utilized),
 - financial cooperation with the non-associated developing countries (2.19 % of the payment appropriations for the financial year were utilized);
- (c) the rate of utilization of appropriations for the following measures was overestimated when the budgetary decision was taken, as a result of the failure to take account of a substantial volume of appropriations to be carried over:
- Social Fund commitment appropriations, which were increased during the year by cancellations and commitments from previous financial years remaining to be cleared,
 - Regional Fund payment appropriations, which were supplemented during the year by carry-overs,
 - technological development projects in the hydrocarbons sector,
 - EAGGF, Guidance Section measures for the marketing and processing of agricultural products (Article 821) and for citrus fruit (Article 853);
- (d) administrative difficulties within the Commission resulted in substantial delays in individual projects under the EAGGF, Guidance Section;

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2. Stresses that the percentages indicated by the Commission in the document on the financial situation as at 31 December 1979 in general relate both to appropriations for the 1979 financial year and to appropriations carried over and that the rate of utilization of the appropriations for the financial year, which is more significant from the budgetary authority's point of view, is in fact lower than the Commission's figures suggest;
3. Must point out that:
 - (a) responsibility for the low rate of utilization of appropriations lies in the first instance with the Commission, which is assigned by the Treaty the task of implementing the budget;
 - (b) this responsibility is heightened to the extent that the Commission did not consult Parliament, on the basis of specific communications, about the difficulties it was encountering;
 - (c) the Council, by not taking the legislative decisions which are a necessary consequence of the entering of appropriations, particularly where these concern new policies, is failing in its duty, disregarding the budgetary powers of Parliament and hampering the implementation of the Community budget drawn up jointly by the institutions;
4. Will devote particular attention, during the discharge procedure for 1979, to consideration of the management of EAGGF, Guarantee Section, appropriations, and above all:
 - (a) the arrangements for informing the Commission of market movements and the way it reacts to them with regard to the management of the EAGGF;
 - (b) the extent to which the Commission and the national bodies comply with the limits on appropriations decided by the budgetary authority;
5. Instructs its appropriate committees:
 - (a) within the context of future budgetary procedures to envisage solutions which the Commission must adopt to correct these shortcomings;
 - (b) to accompany proposals for new appropriations by directives relating to their implementation and, where these directives cannot be applied immediately, to adjust the budgetary proposals accordingly.

20. Budgetary control aspects of the Data-Processing Centre (vote)

The next item was the vote on the motion for a resolution contained in the interim report by Mr Kellett-Bowman (Doc. 1-283/80).

The rapporteur stated that the three amendments tabled to this motion for a resolution had not been moved during the debate.

Mr Colla and the rapporteur spoke.

Pursuant to Rule 29 (1), third subparagraph, Parliament did not consider these amendments.

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

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RESOLUTION

on the budgetary control aspects of the Data-Processing Centre of the Commission of the European Communities

The European Parliament,

- recalling its earlier resolution on the budgetary aspects of the operations of the data-processing centre ⁽¹⁾,
- wishing to ensure that wasteful use of resources does not occur and that there is no avoidable overlapping of acquisition of equipment by the institutions of the European Communities,
- desirous that full information on all matters undergoing political audit should be available to its Committee on Budgetary Control,
- conscious of the need to make available to the institutions of the Community an adequate data-processing service,
- stressing the importance of transparency of the budgetary presentation of appropriations for data-processing as well as for other services,
- believing that it is desirable to have regard to the medium-term and longer-term options in the sphere of data-processing, if Community needs are to be met economically,
- having regard to the interim report of the Committee on Budgetary Control (Doc. 1-283/80),

1. Notes the apparent transitional difficulties experienced by the data processing centre in effecting the changeover to new equipment intended to cope with an increasing work load;
2. Calls for (a) thoroughgoing periodic reviews of existing programmes so as to verify that there is a continuing justification for them, and (b) a careful screening of proposed new programmes in order to ensure optimum use of equipment and staff time;
3. Expects that staff savings should result from the use of data-processing techniques and equipment, and asks the Commission to have special regard to this aspect in its annual reports on data-processing;
4. Is conscious of the escalating cost of manning the centre and is anxious to effect tight control over outlay in this area;
5. Expresses its concern that difficulties in regard to the recruitment, motivation and management of the appropriate personnel should be manifest at the centre, and expects an early improvement in this regard;
6. Considers that the Commission's data-processing centre should be fully utilized by the other institutions so as to avoid overlapping of effort or the acquisition of costly duplicate installations, and asks the Commission to evolve an appropriate legal formula which will guarantee access by the other institutions to the data-processing centre;

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7. Insists that the Commission, and all other Community institutions and bodies, should make available all necessary data and background material to Parliament's Committee on Budgetary Control in a frank and prompt manner so that fully-informed democratic control can be effected;
8. Would like to be assured that, where possible, Community data processing operations of an ad hoc nature are offered for tender so as to ensure the most economic solutions, and believes that regard should always be had to the prospective medium- and longer-term situation when solutions to short-term issues are being sought;
9. Attaches great importance to the clarity and transparency of budget presentation as this is essential (a) to the work of the budgetary authority in considering the draft budget and (b) to the work of control;
10. Will consider a further report from its Committee on Budgetary Control when the report of the Court of Auditors on the matter is to hand and the Commission has provided further information on the recent acquisition of equipment and on its views on (a) the longer-term requirements of the Community in this sphere, and (b) the organization of data processing activity;
11. Urges that, pending reception of this further report, no institution should take steps that would pre-empt the establishment of a Community wide data-processing service;
12. Recognizes that an appropriate procurement policy for data processing equipment at the level of the Community institutions could constitute a valuable element in the integration of European industrial policy;
13. Instructs its President to forward this resolution and the report of its Committee to the other institutions of the Community.

21. Situation of refugees in the Horn of Africa (vote)

The next item was the vote on the motion for a resolution contained in the report by Mr Marshall (Doc. 1-289/80).

Parliament adopted the first indent of the preamble.

After the first indent of the preamble, Mr Coppieters and Mrs Castellina had tabled amendment No 4 seeking to insert a new indent.

The rapporteur spoke.

Amendment No 4 was adopted.

Parliament adopted the second and third indents of the preamble.

After the third indent of the preamble, Mr Coppieters and Mrs Castellina had tabled amendment No 5 seeking to insert a new indent.

The rapporteur spoke.

As the result of the show of hands and of the first vote by sitting and standing was doubtful, Parliament took a fresh vote by sitting and standing and adopted amendment No 5.

On paragraph 1, two amendments had been tabled:

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— No 1 by Mr Narducci, Mrs Cassanmagnago Cerretti, Mr Bersani, Mr Vergeer and Mr Michel,

— No 6 by Mr Coppieters and Mrs Castellina, both seeking to replace this paragraph with a new text.

The rapporteur spoke.

Amendment No 1 was rejected.

Amendment No 6 was adopted.

After paragraph 1, two amendments had been tabled seeking to insert a new paragraph:

— No 2 by Mr Narducci and others,

— No 7 by Mr Coppieters and Mrs Castellina.

The rapporteur spoke.

Amendment No 2 was adopted.

Amendment No 7 was adopted.

On paragraph 2, Mr Narducci and others had tabled amendment No 3 seeking to replace this paragraph with a new text.

The rapporteur spoke.

Amendment No 3 was adopted.

Parliament adopted paragraph 3.

On paragraph 4, Mr Coppieters and Mrs Castellina had tabled amendment No 8 seeking to replace this paragraph with a new text.

The rapporteur spoke.

Amendment No 8 was rejected.

Parliament adopted paragraph 4 and then paragraph 5.

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

on the dramatic situation of the refugees, especially the children amongst them, in the Horn of Africa

The European Parliament,

- very preoccupied by the disastrous situation of the refugees in the Horn of Africa,
- noting that the situation has been worsening rapidly in recent months and that not only refugees but the rest of the population of Somalia and neighbouring countries will be threatened with starvation in the coming months,
- recalling its resolution of 14 December 1979 on the tragic plight of refugees, particularly children, in the Horn of Africa ⁽¹⁾,
- noting that, in addition to the threat of starvation and the dramatic shortage of water, there is also a real danger of epidemics of disease, in particular cholera,
- having regard to the report of the Committee on Development and Cooperation (Doc. 1-289/80),

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1. Calls for an increase of the Community's food-aid programme and its exceptional aid programme based on Article 59 of the Lomé Convention, especially in order to meet the increasing food needs of this region of Africa in the final half of 1980, and for emergency measures, including, if need be, a special airlift to ensure that the aid rapidly reaches those for whom it is intended;
2. Insists on the need for combined use of all available instruments of cooperation in order to provide a serious response to the alarming situation of the million and a half refugees in Somalia who are threatened with famine and epidemics of the plague and cholera and are, in many cases, experiencing a situation of total deprivation which is unacceptable to the international conscience;
3. Calls on the Commission and Council to take urgent steps to provide the financial and technical assistance needed to meet the specific problem of water supplies, in particular by the provision of shallow wells;
4. Welcomes the Community's increased aid to the UN High Commission for Refugees, and asks the Community to continue its close collaboration with this organization and to strengthen substantially its support for the non-governmental organizations which are implementing local aid projects vital to the survival of the most deprived sectors of the population;
5. Appeals again to the Foreign Ministers meeting in political cooperation to take all the necessary diplomatic initiatives to end the conflict between Ethiopia and Somalia;
6. Asks the European Commission to submit half-yearly reports on the Community's aid to countries in the Horn of Africa, thus enabling its Committee on Development and Cooperation to monitor this work;
7. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Council, the Commission, the Foreign Ministers of the Nine meeting in political cooperation and the Secretaries-General of the United Nations, the OAU and the ACP Group.

Mr Griffiths gave an explanation of vote.

22. Aid to refugees in the South China Sea — Aid to Kampuchea — Border incident between Vietnamese and Thai troops (vote)

The next item was the vote on three motions for resolutions.

— *Motion for a resolution by Mr Schieler and others (Doc. 1-284/80)*

Lady Elles gave an explanation of vote on behalf of the European Democratic Group.

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

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RESOLUTION

on aid to refugees in the South China Sea

The European Parliament,

- recalling its resolutions of 19 July 1979 on the tragedy of the Indo-Chinese refugees ⁽¹⁾ and 23 May 1980 on the deaths of thousands of Cambodian children ⁽²⁾,
 - having regard to the dramatic increase in the flood of refugees in the South China Sea (10 000 refugees per month and rising),
 - aware that a large number of refugees perish by drowning in the sea,
 - in the knowledge that only one European vessel (Cap Anamur) equipped to rescue shipwrecked refugees is still operating in the China Sea, now that other European ships have had to call off their rescue operations,
1. Calls on the Council to prevail upon the Governments of the Member States to increase the overall quota of refugees in view of the upsurge in their numbers and to make an allocation among the Member States of the Community;
 2. Calls on the Commission to use Community budget appropriations to support the rescue vessel Cap Anamur rather than a separate European Community vessel;
 3. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Council and the Commission.

Parliament rejected the preamble and paragraphs 1 to 4.

After paragraph 4, Mrs Weiss had tabled amendment No 1 seeking to insert a new paragraph.

The rapporteur spoke.

Amendment No 1 was rejected.

Parliament rejected paragraph 5.

The motion for a resolution was therefore rejected.

— *Motion for a resolution by Mr Rinsche and others* (Doc. 1-312/80)

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

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RESOLUTION

on the border incident between Vietnamese troops from Cambodia and Thai troops in Thailand

The European Parliament,

- having regard to its resolution on relations between the European Community and Asean ⁽¹⁾,
 - having regard to its resolutions on the tragic situation of South-East Asian refugees, and in particular those from Cambodia ⁽²⁾,
 - most concerned by the serious border incident between Vietnamese and Thai forces around Ban Non Makmoon village in Thailand from 23 to 26 June 1980 and the continuing tension on this border where many thousands of refugees were existing through the efforts of the Thai Government and the international agencies, in particular, UNHCR, Unicef and the ICRC,
 - fearful of the consequences of this incident for the lives of the refugees in the area,
1. Declares its full support for the statement made on 2 July 1980 by the Foreign Ministers of the Member States meeting in political cooperation, which reaffirmed the European Community's solidarity with Asean in their joint commitment to world peace, economic development, social justice and human rights;
 2. Deplores, with them, the violation by Vietnamese troops of the territorial integrity and national sovereignty of Thailand, a member State of Asean;
 3. Also reaffirms with them the joint conviction that all governments should base their international conduct on principles embodying the respect for sovereignty, territorial integrity, the independence of states, the non-resort to force or threat of the use of force and non-interference in the internal affairs of other states, principles most recently not respected in South-East and South-West Asia;
 4. Calls for the re-opening as a matter of urgency of the land bridge between Thailand and Cambodia so that humanitarian aid from international organizations and from the EEC may once again reach the many thousands of refugees in that area;
 5. Instructs its Political Affairs Committee to follow closely the activities and statements of the Foreign Ministers meeting in political cooperation concerning the possibilities of stationing a UN observer team on the Thai side of the Thailand-Cambodian border and on the early withdrawal of Vietnamese troops from Cambodia;
 6. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Council, the Commission, the Foreign Ministers meeting in political cooperation and for information to the Asean Brussels Committee — the diplomatic representatives of the Asean States accredited to the European Community.

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23. EEC-United States relations in the steel sector (vote)

The next item was the vote on the motion for a resolution by Mr Seal and others (Doc. 1-316/80).

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

on relations between the EEC and the United States in the steel sector

The European Parliament,

- having regard to its resolution of 18 April 1980 ⁽¹⁾,
- stressing the economic and social implications of the present problems in the steel sector between the USA and the EEC,
- 1. Emphasizes that the EEC is honouring the 1977 OECD Agreement and complying with the GATT anti-dumping code;
- 2. Affirms that in the steel trade between the EEC and USA, neither confrontation nor protectionism will produce a settlement in the interest of the partner countries and the working population;
- 3. Calls on the US Government to ask US Steel to withdraw its antidumping procedure and start urgent negotiations with the Commission;
- 4. Stresses that, if such an agreement cannot be reached and if the American Government infringes the GATT provisions, the EEC should immediately take appropriate countermeasures;
- 5. Asks the Commission to report back to Parliament at the September 1980 part-session;
- 6. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission of the European Communities and to the United States Government.

24. Human rights in Argentina (vote)

The next item was the vote on the motion for a resolution by Mr Klepsch and others (Doc. 1-318/80).

Lady Elles raised a point of order on behalf of the European Democratic Group.

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

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RESOLUTION

on the serious violations of human rights and international law by the Argentinian military regime

The European Parliament,

— having regard to the resolution in which it undertook to promote respect for human rights throughout the world and to its earlier resolutions on Argentina,

— having learnt with horror of the abduction by Argentinian troops, with the assistance of members of the Peruvian armed forces, of four Argentinian political exiles who had sought refuge in Lima, Mrs Noemi Ester Gianetti de Molfino, Mrs Julia Inès Santos Achabal, Mr Frederico Frias Alberga and Mr Julio Cesar Ramirez, on 11, 12 and 13 June;

1. Expresses its profound admiration for the Peruvian political leaders such as Antonio Maza Cuadra and Luis Bedoya Reyes, Members of Parliament, for their immediate public denunciation of the terrorist operation carried out by the Argentinian military forces with the aid of some members of the Peruvian forces in direct violation of the right to asylum and of the national sovereignty of Peru and for having thereby prevented the abduction of further Argentinian exiles;

2. Makes an urgent appeal for everything possible to be done at all levels to trace and save the four Argentinian citizens who have disappeared since their abduction, assuming that they have not already died as a result of torture;

3. Expresses once again its condemnation of the Argentinian military junta, which consistently violates the basic rights and fundamental freedoms of human beings in the name of its criminal ideology of 'national security';

4. Denounces the secret plan of cooperation between the Argentinian and Peruvian forces aimed at eliminating all the exiled opponents of the Argentinian regime, and the increasing collusion among the police forces of the dictatorial regimes of South America, which has resulted in many political exiles being abducted and killed;

5. Objects violently, furthermore, to the repeated attempts by the Argentinian secret services to intimidate exiles in Europe;

6. Calls on the Commission and Council to undertake, in close collaboration with the appropriate committees of Parliament, a critical study of economic and trade relations between the EEC and Argentina;

7. Invites the Foreign Ministers meeting in political cooperation jointly and systematically to take steps to urge the Argentinian authorities to free all political detainees and prisoners and to respect the right of the families of the missing exiles to be informed and to be protected against paramilitary and parapolice terrorism, and to coordinate their action within the various international organizations responsible for such questions;

8. Undertakes to strengthen its cooperation with the Latin-American Parliament and, bearing in mind the Fifth European/Latin-American Interparliamentary Conference scheduled for the beginning of 1985, to put forward again the Granelli proposals for the setting up of a permanent joint information centre to provide for urgent action where

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human rights are violated, as such a centre would ensure the necessary coordination with all bodies such as the Inter-American Human Rights Commission, United Nations agencies and its working party set up to enquire into cases of persons who have disappeared;

9. Instructs its Political Affairs Committee to monitor the action taken on this resolution and to submit a report in due course;

10. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Council, the Commission, the Foreign Ministers of the Nine meeting in political cooperation, the President of the Latin-American Parliament and the Secretary-General of the United Nations.

25. Importation of fresh lemons (vote)

The next item was the vote on the motion for a resolution contained in the report by Mr Giummarra (Doc. 1-285/80).

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

embodying the opinion of the European Parliament on the proposal from the Commission of the European Communities to the Council for a Regulation amending Regulation (EEC) No 471/76 as regards the period of suspension of the application of the condition on prices governing the importation into the Community of fresh lemons originating in certain Mediterranean countries

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the proposal from the Commission to the Council ⁽¹⁾,
- having been consulted by the Council pursuant to Articles 43 and 113 of the EEC Treaty (Doc. 1-34/80),
- having regard to the report of the Committee on External Economic Relations and the opinion of the Committee on Budgets (Doc. 1-285/80),

Approves the Commission's proposal.

26. Conservation and management of fishery resources (vote)

The next item was the vote on the motion for a resolution contained in the report by Mr Gautier (Doc. 1-304/80).

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

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RESOLUTION

embodying the opinion of the European Parliament on the proposals from the Commission of the European Communities to the Council for

- I. a Regulation allocating catch quotas between Member States for vessels fishing in Faroese waters
- II. a Regulation allocating catch quotas between Member States for vessels fishing in Swedish waters
- III. a Regulation allocating certain catch quotas between Member States for vessels fishing in the Norwegian exclusive economic zone, and
- IV. a Regulation laying down for the year 1980 certain measures for the conservation and management of fishery resources off the West Greenland coast applicable to vessels flying the flag of a Member State

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the proposals from the Commission to the Council ⁽¹⁾,
 - having been consulted by the Council pursuant to Article 43 of the EEC Treaty (Doc. 1-232/80 and Doc. 1-272/80),
 - having regard to the report by the Committee on Agriculture (Doc. 1-304/80),
 - whereas fisheries agreements with third countries are important to the future of the Community's fishing industry,
1. Emphasizes that the quotas to be allocated to the Community by Norway represent a considerable reduction on quotas allocated in previous years, without there being a reduction equivalent in quantity in the quotas allocated by the Community to Norway;
 2. Expresses the deepest concern at the considerable hardship such a reduction will cause to Community fishermen;
 3. Believes, furthermore, that the Commission's proposals should be modified in order to respect the distribution of catch quotas between Member States in previous years;
 4. Rejects therefore the Commission's proposals concerning Faroese, Swedish and Norwegian waters;
 5. Approves the proposal concerning measures off the West Greenland coast;
 6. Asks the Commission to justify its failure to adopt for the proposal relating to Swedish waters, which concerns Denmark and Germany alone, the agreement worked out between these two countries;
 7. Emphasizes the utmost importance of proper surveillance and control of these and all other quota allocations;
 8. Underlines the fact that it was unable to make a proper comparison of the quotas to be granted and received by the Community when considering the Commission's proposal to grant quotas to Norway;

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9. Considers that any opinion given by the European Parliament on the Commission's proposals must inevitably be devoid of any significance since the negotiations with the countries concerned have been concluded;
10. Believes, therefore, that the roles of both Parliament and the Council have been reduced to rubber-stamping negotiations conducted solely by the Commission;
11. Considers, therefore, that the European Parliament, and the Council, should examine:
- (a) the purpose of continuing to grant a benediction to proposals which cannot be modified;
 - (b) the steps to be taken to ensure that sufficient information is provided, before and during negotiations, on the fish stock situation and the broad requirements of the Community and the third countries concerned, with more formal negotiating mandates being drawn up for consideration by Parliament and the Council.

27. **Statistical surveys of areas under vines (vote)**

The next item was the vote on the motion for a resolution contained in the report by Mr Colleselli (Doc. 1-302/80).

Parliament adopted the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

embodying the opinion of the European Parliament on the proposal from the Commission of the European Communities to the Council for a Regulation amending Regulation (EEC) No 357/79 on statistical surveys of areas under vines

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the proposal from the Commission to the Council ⁽¹⁾,
 - having been consulted by the Council pursuant to Article 43 of the EEC Treaty (Doc. 1-133/80),
 - having regard to the report of the Committee on Agriculture and the opinion of the Committee on Budgets (Doc. 1-302/80),
1. Recognizes the real difficulties encountered by Italy in carrying out the first basic statistical survey of areas under vines and her commitment, in spite of these difficulties to supply the Commission with all data necessary for a full understanding of the situation;
 2. Requests the Commission to propose 31 December 1981 as the deadline for carrying out the first basic survey on areas under vines in Italy;

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3. Also requests the Commission to examine in conjunction with the government concerned the possibility of carrying out the survey in Italy using techniques similar to those already planned for the register of olive cultivation, namely aerial photography, remote surveys and electronic data processing, so as to improve the quality of the results and to enable the planned intermediate surveys to be carried out as quickly and efficiently as possible.

Lord O'Hagan spoke.

— Mr Sherlock and Mr Kellett-Bowman as members of the Committee on Development and Cooperation to replace Mr Marshall and Mr Simmonds respectively,

28. Composition of committees

At the request of the European Democratic Group, Parliament ratified the appointment of:

— Mr Patterson as member of the Committee on Budgetary Control to replace Mr J. M. Taylor,

— Sir John Stewart-Clark as member of the Political Affairs Committee to replace Mr Jakobsen,

— Mr de Courcy Ling as member of the Committee on the Rules of Procedure and Petitions to replace Mr Tyrrell.

— Mr Hord as member of the Committee on Agriculture to replace Mr Howell,

— Mr Newton Dunn and Mr Howell as members of the Committee on Budgets to replace Lord O'Hagan and Mr Hord respectively,

29. Composition of Parliament

The President informed Parliament that the competent French authorities had informed him of the election of Mr Jean-José Clément as member of the European Parliament to replace Mr Labbé, who had resigned.

— Mr Beazley as member of the Committee on Economic and Monetary Affairs to replace Sir Peter Vanneck,

— Mr Price and Mr Moreland as members of the Committee on Energy and Research to replace Lord Douro and Sir Peter Vanneck respectively,

He welcomed the new member and pointed out that, pursuant to Rule 3 (3), any member whose credentials had not yet been verified provisionally took his seat in Parliament and on its committees with the same rights as other members.

— Mr Spicer and Lord O'Hagan as members of the Committee on External Economic Relations to replace Mr de Courcy Ling and Mr Kellett-Bowman respectively,

— Mr J. D. Taylor as member of the Committee on Social Affairs and Employment to replace Miss Roberts,

30. ACP — EEC Consultative Assembly

Parliament ratified the appointments of the members of the European Parliament to the ACP—EEC Consultative Assembly which had been submitted to it by the political groups, it being understood that one post remained to be filled (1).

— Sir Peter Vanneck as member of the Committee on the Environment, Public Health and Consumer Protection to replace Mr Newton Dunn,
