# Proceedings of the sitting

IN THE CHAIR: MR PFLIMLIN

- having regard to the report of the Committee on Social Affairs and Employment and the opinion of the Committee on Budgets (Doc. A2-124/85) and to the second report of the Committee on Social Affairs and Employment (Doc. A2-163/85),
- having regard to the result of the vote on the Commission's proposal,
- Takes note of the Commission's proposal which is aimed at extending aid for the creation of additional jobs to cover jobs for self-employed persons as well as those for employed persons;
- Recognizes that, in view of the serious employment situation facing young people in particular, it is legitimate to take any measures which can contribute — on however small a scale - to reducing unemployment;
- Is nevertheless worried that, given the limited budget resources available to the Fund, this new type of Social Fund expenditure, whose true impact and effect on the budget are not known, may
- increase the disparity between the number of applications submitted and the appropriations available.
- invalidate the efforts to improve quality made by the Commission in its guidelines for the period 1986-1988, which are designed to avoid spreading aid too thinly to ensure that Fund assistance is meaningful,
- call into question the principle of the conditionality of Community aid by running the risk of becoming a direct channel of finance to national budgets;
- Is firmly convinced that the Fund should not act as an alternative to the measures already in progress at national level, but should assist national employment policies on a selective basis in accordance with the principle of additionality, which should improve the quality of both the type and results of the projects carried out;

# Proceedings of the sitting

IN THE CHAIR: MR PFLIMLIN

### President

(The sitting was opened at 10 a.m.)

The following spoke: Mr Graefe Zu Baringdorf on the incidents which occurred during the sheepfarmers' demonstration held outside Parliament the previous day, Mrs Veil on his remarks, and Mr Pearce on a Bureau decision to increase the special duty allowance of certain Members.

# 1. Agenda

Mr Welsh, Chairman of the Committee on Social Affairs, asked for the vote on the Dido report (Doc. A 2-161/85) to be postponed until voting time on Thursday.

Parliament agreed to this request.

# 2. Approval of minutes

Mr Ford, Chairman of the Committee of Inquiry into the Rise of Fascism and Racism in Europe, asked that the words 'The President declared the debate closed' be deleted at the end of the item concerning the debate on his committee's report (Doc. A 2-160/85) (see part I, item 22 of Tuesday's minutes) since in his view only the first stage of the debate had been concluded.

The President replied that he could not agree to this as the debate had in fact been closed.

The minutes of the previous sitting were approved.

# 6. Conciliation procedure

The President reminded the House that, in its resolution on the proposal for a Regulation on a programme of support for technological development in the hydrocarbons sector, adopted on the basis of the Seligman report (Doc. A 2-36/85), and in its resolution on the proposals for Regulations on demonstration projects, adopted on the basis of the Starita report (Doc. A 2-82/85), Parliament had reserved the right to initiate the conciliation procedure should the Council depart substantially from Parliament's opinion.

At its meeting of 28 November 1985, the Committee on Energy as the committee responsible had decided to propose to Parliament not to open the conciliation procedure.

If no-one opposed this proposal when that day's minutes were submitted to Parliament for approval, these requests for conciliation would be deemed to have lapsed.

### RESOLUTION

following the debate on the statements by the Council and the Commission after the meeting of the European Council on 2 and 3 December 1985 in Luxembourg

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the draft Treaty of European Union (1),
- having regard to its resolutions of 17 April and 23 October 1985 on institutional matters (2),
- having regard to the synthesis drawn up by the Committee on Institutional Affairs containing a comparison of the proposals submitted to the Intergovernmental Conference with Parliament's draft Treaty (PE 101.517/Syn.fin.) (3),
- having regard to the final declaration of the European Council meeting in Luxembourg on 2 and 3 December 1985 (4),
- A. Whereas the European Council did not even take into account the solemn declaration made in Stuttgart on 19 June 1983, in which it announced that the European Parliament's opinion would be sought as soon as the time came to incorporate the progress achieved on the path to European unification into a treaty on union,
- Reaffirms its conviction that a radical institutional reform of the Community and of political cooperation can no longer be put off without danger for the political and economic future and the dignity of democratic Europe, a fact expressly acknowledged by the European Council meeting in Milan in June 1985;
- Notes that the work of the Intergovernmental Conference and the conclusions reached by the European Council have defined most of the central problems of Community policy which should be dealt with (creation of an area free of internal frontiers, the Community's monetary capacity, economic and social cohesion, research and technological development, environment and social policy);
- Notes that the Council has embarked on the road to reform, but that in their present form the conclusions remain incomplete and do not enable the objectives stated in the Conference mandate to be attained, particularly since, owing to the ambiguity of certain of the texts, there is, on the one hand, still uncertainty as to the establishment of the European area by 1992, in other fields the Community's powers are defined in restrictive terms, the question of reforming the system of Community finances, particularly that of associating the European Parliament in the matter of Community revenue, is completely ignored, and, on the other hand, the proposed modifications to the decision-making process do not offer the necessary guarantee as to effectiveness and the democratic character thereof;

- 4. Believes that, at a time of unemployment and imbalance among the regions, a genuine union of peoples cannot be achieved unless a social dimension is given to the European area defined by the European Council and unless the cohesion of this European area is strengthened by showing solidarity with the less-developed countries and regions:
- 5. Notes that the draft Treaty on cooperation with regard to foreign policy is restricted to confirming what already exists and leaves open the problem of the unity of the Treaties;
- 6. Notes the conclusions of the European Council meeting in Luxembourg; reserves its final position until the results of the meeting of Foreign Ministers on 16 December 1985 are made known; but considers that the results of the European Council as a whole are unsatisfactory and is unable to accept in their present form the proposed modifications to the EEC Treaty, particularly as regards the powers of the European Parliament;
- 7. Approves the action of the Italian Government, which kept the debate open to enable the governments to take account of Parliament's position and thus allow an agreement to be reached between the Community institutions;
- 8. Reaffirms its attachment to the spirit and method of its draft Treaty but, in a desire to collaborate with the Intergovernmental Conference and the European Council, hereby indicates the substance of the amendments which Parliament will ask the Council on 16 and 17 December 1985 to make to the European Council's texts, taking due account of the problems raised during the Conference, and of the possible need to introduce an element of gradualness into the implementation of powers for the Community and its institutions;
- 9. Calls on the Council of Foreign Ministers meeting on 16 and 17 December 1985 to take the necessary steps to:
- (a) clarify and finalize the preocedure for cooperation between the Council and the European Parliament so as to arrive at a genuine joint decision-making procedure,
- (b) complete the general content of the decisions adopted at the Summit, in particular as regards monetary cooperation and the unity of the Treaties;

and stresses that, more particularly as regards the effectiveness and democratic nature of Community decisions, the main thrust of the improvements to be made is as follows:

- the new 'cooperation' procedure provided for in Article 149 (new) should apply to all acts pursuant to articles in the Treaties under which the Council is required to take a majority decision.
- at the end of the second reading provided for in Article 149 (new), the Council should act on the texts issued by Parliament. The Council should not be able to modify amendments adopted by Parliament except by a qualified majority; inasmuch as such amendments are supported by the Commission, the Council should be able to modify them only by a unanimous vote and, in the absence of any decision by the Council within a period of three months, the text proposed by Parliament should be deemed to have been adopted,
- a procedure should be introduced within the Council to ensure that a common position is arrived at during the first reading within a reasonable period of time,
- it is not possible to accept the new Article 145 in so far as it enables the Council to take away certain executive powers from the Commission and exercise them itself. This is a dangerous innovation and is inconsistent with the need to strengthen the role of the Commission as provided for in Article 149 (new);
- 10. Decides that, if the Council on 16 and 17 December 1985 fails to reach agreement on the proposals contained in the preceding paragraph, the European Parliament will propose at the earliest opportunity the amendments to the texts of the European Council meeting in Luxembourg which are necessary to enable the texts to be adopted, and instructs its Committee on Institutional Affairs to submit these amendments to it;
- 11. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the European Council, the Commission, the governments of the Member States, the national parliaments and the Spanish and Potuguese governments and parliaments.

### WRITTEN DECLARATION

### on Iranian Baha'is

### The European Parliament,

- A. believing that religious freedom is a fundamental human right,
- B. conscious of Article 5 of the UN Declaration of Human Rights which states 'no one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment' and mindful of Article 9 of the European Convention, which refers to the right of religious freedom,
- C. aware of the inhuman treatment and summary execution of members of the Baha'i community in Iranian prisons,
- D. concerned about recent reports indicating that the Iranian Government has, once again, begun to carry out wholesale executions against the Baha'i community,
- E. disturbed by reports of the execution of Mr Abbas Idilkhani and Mr Rahmatu'llah Vujdani in August and by the fact that Mr Idilkhani's grave was accidentally discovered near Teheran, and his family had not been informed of his execution,
- F. concerned as to the fate of the 741 Baha'is still held in Iranian prisons,

- G. aware of recent laws which forbid any reference to the plight of the Baha'is in the Iranian media,
- 1. Condemns yet again the systematic violation of human rights of religious minorities in Iran, in particular the Baha'i community;
- 2. Believes that such violations of basic human rights can only act as a barrier to an improvement in relations between Iran and the Community;
- 3. Condemns the use of the death penalty against people whose only crime is to practice a different faith from that ordained by the State;
- 4. Instructs the President to send this written declaration to the President of Iran, the Islamic Conference, the Council of the European Communities and the Secretary-General of the United Nations.

# 1. Human Rights

(a) Doc. B2-1304/85

#### RESOLUTION

## on the situation in Afghanistan

- A. having regard to the resolution adopted on 13 November 1985 by the General Assembly of the United Nations with the support of 122 nations and calling for the withdrawal of Soviet troops from Afghanistan,
- B. whereas a report on the situation in Afghanistan is currently being drawn up by the European Parliament's Political Affairs Committee; whereas in view of the following facts immediate action is necessary,
- C. concerned at the continuing and escalating conflicts between the invading Soviet troops and the resistance fighters (Myjaheddin),
- D. whereas approximately 4 million Afghans roughly one-third of the population have fled and about 3 million of these have found refuge in Pakistan,
- E. deeply disturbed at the refusal of the Soviet Union to allow the International Red Cross to set up field hospitals on Afghan soil,
- F. whereas, consequently, only about one-quarter of the wounded Mujaheddin are able to reach the Pakistani border and obtain medical care while the remainder receive no such care and bleed to death in the battle zone,
- G. concerned at the fact that food aid provided by the countries of the European Community for the Afghan refugees in Pakistan is steadily diminishing:

- 1. Calls on the Soviet Union immediately and unconditionally to authorize the international Red Cross to tend wounded persons on Afghan soil, as is the accepted practice in Kampuchea and in the Iran-Iraq conflict;
- 2. Calls on the Commission and Council to ensure that food aid from the Community Member States is not reduced but increased, in view of the growing stream of refugees;
- 3. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission, the Council and the Governments of the Soviet Union and Pakistan.

(b) Doc. B2-1321/85

#### RESOLUTION

## on the refusal of a Soviet exit visa to the Lurje family

The European Parliament,

- A. Whereas an exit visa, granted in 1979 to Emanuel and Judith Lurje, amd their daughters Anna and Bella and also to Judith Lurje's mother, Rika Kulbak, was then suddenly withdrawn for all the Lurje family while Mrs Kulbak was allowed to emigrate to Israel (in January 1980),
- B. In view of the suffering endured by the parents of both Emanuel and Judith Lurje under Stalin, including the imprisonment and death of Mrs Lurje's father in the 'Jewish Socialist Republic of Birobidjan' and the death of Emanuel's father in a slave labour camp,
- C. Concerned at this violation of fundamental human rights, and notably of Section 1 of the provisions of the Helsinki Final Act relating to 'Cooperation in Humanitarian and Other Fields',
- D. Deploring in particular the deliberate splitting of families and the persistent harassment of those who have been refused exit visas from the Soviet Union,
- 1. Calls on the Government of the Soviet Union to grant an exit visa for the Lurje family at the earliest possible date, and in general to resume the granting of exit visas for families wishing to emigrate;
- 2. Asks the Soviet Government to limit to five years, instead of the present indefinite period, the time during which employment classified as secret may be used as a reason for refusing an exit visa and to limit the use of this classification to employment genuinely secret and important to the State:
- 3. Urges the Foreign Ministers meeting in Political Cooperation to take up energetically the Lurjes' case, and to call for full application of those provisions of the Helsinki Final Act which stipulate that those who wish to leave their country are to be allowed to do so;
- 4. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Foreign Ministers meeting in Political Cooperation and the Government of the Soviet Union.
- 2. Anglo-Irish Agreement
- Compromise amendment to Docs. B2-1306, 1333 and 1335/85

# RESOLUTION

# on the Anglo-Irish Agreement

- A. recalling that one of the principal motives of the founding fathers of the European Community was the conciliation of differences in a strife-torn Europe,
- B. having regard to the Agreement between the Government of Ireland and the Government of the United Kingdom, signed at Hillsborough on 15 November 1985, the aims of which are to promote peace and stability in Northern Ireland; to reconcile the two major traditions in Ireland; to create a new climate of friendship and cooperation between the people of the two countries and to improve cooperation in combating terrorism,

- C. noting that the two governments will consider in the British/Irish intergovernmental conference the possibility of securing international support for the work of promoting the economic and social development of those parts of Ireland which have suffered most severely from the consequences of the instability of recent years,
- D. recognizing that the strife in Northern Ireland with its terrible cost in terms of loss of lives and injury in Northern Ireland, Ireland and Great Britain is the greatest single source of violence in the Europe Community today,
- E. aware of the extensive damage to the economies of both parts of Ireland,
- F. recognizing the major interest of the European Community in helping to create conditions of stability, justice and prosperity in all parts of the Community,
- G. recalling its resolution of 29 March 1984 on Northern Ireland (1) which called on the British and Irish Governments to take a joint initiative,
- 1. Welcomes the Agreement signed by the two governments and hopes for its full and early implementation;
- 2. Calls for an immediate end to violence and terrorism from whatever source;
- 3. Believes that the Agreement offers a unique opportunity to make progress towards peace and reconciliation in Ireland by recognizing the validity of both traditions in Northern Ireland;
- 4. Believes that the Agreement will have all the greater chance of success if it is underpinned by a programme of economic development which would reduce unemployment and poverty, which are both a consequence of and a contributing factor to the violence;
- 5. Therefore reaffirms its call to the competent Community bodies to assume a greater responsibility in the economic and social development of Northern Ireland and thereby give practical expression to the Parliament's resolution of 29 March 1984;
- 6. Calls also upon the other Member States of the European Community to consider ways and means of supporting the British/Irish Agreement;
- 7. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission, the Council and the Ministers meeting in Political Cooperation.

# 3. Ethiopia

(a) Doc. B2-1295/85

# RESOLUTION

on the mass transfers of population in Ethiopia and the expulsion of 'Médecins sans frontières'

- A. whereas more than half a million people have already been moved by the Ethiopian Government between November 1984 and August 1985,
- B. whereas the Ethiopian regime has already embarked on a second phase of transfers, which is once again to affect at least 500 000 people, in flagrant violation of the formal undertaking given to Members of the European Parliament in July this year,

- C. having regard to the information collected by officials belonging to several non-governmental organizations working on the spot, particularly 'Médecins sans frontières', with regard to the conditions under which these people are being transferred from the northern to the southern region of Ethiopia,
- D. whereas transport and reception conditions for the people moved to the south of the country lead to an extremely high death-rate,
- E. whereas the basic conditions on which such transfers should depend, i.e. that they should be carried out on a voluntary basis, that families should not be separated and that those involved should be in a fit state of health, are, in most cases, not met,
- F. whereas local emergency, aid and rehabilitation operations and plans carried out in the north of the country are made difficult, if not impossible, by the absolute priority which the government attaches to transfers of population,
- G. whereas the heavy rainfall this summer would have given hope of a harvest in the north of the country and of being able to put those regions back on their feet, but the required conditions for aid were not met, owing to the mass deportation policy,
- 1. Requests the Commission, the Council and the governments of the Member States to ask for an immediate halt, lasting at least six months, in transfers of population from the north of Ethiopia to the south, so that, under international supervision, it can be established if they are really necessary and, if so, what the minimum humanitarian conditions for carrying out the resettlement operations should be;
- 2. Condemns the expulsion by the Ethiopian Government of the humanitarian organization 'Médecins sans frontières' (France) for its courageous disclosures concerning the population transfers, which upset the Ethiopian authorities;
- 3. Requests the Commission, the Council and the governments of the Member States to ask for an unrestricted on-the-spot investigation to be carried out by the International Red Cross and the WHO into the actual conditions in which these transfers are being carried out;
- 4. Considers that the European Community must be fully informed as to the actual facts of the situation with regard to population movement in Ethiopia, so that it is in a position to check that the aid it supplies is properly used and effective;
- 5. Urges the Commission in this connection to propose to the Ethiopian Government, by analogy with the procedures for food aid, that the EEC and the NGOs accredited by it should be closely associated at every stage of the population resettlement operations whenever this is clearly necessary, and bearing in mind that the Community would meet the costs of medical and food supplies;
- 6. Reiterates its willingness to send a parliamentary delegation at any time to carry out a direct check on the actual facts of the situation;
- 7. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission, the Council, the governments of the Member States and the Ethiopian Government.

(b) Doc. B2-1297/85

#### RESOLUTION

#### on the situation in Ethiopia

- A. horrified at the death in Ethiopia of thousands of people decimated by famine, including many children, and the suffering of millions of others,
- B. profoundly disturbed by the inability of the Ethiopian authorities to distribute food and other supplies, much of which is left decaying at the ports,

- C. shocked at the priority given by the Ethiopian Government to the acquisition of arms rather than cooperation with non-governmental organizations in combating hunger,
- D. convinced that, in the present circumstances, the transportation of thousands of people from the north to the south of Ethiopia can only increase the loss of human life and the suffering of the people,
- E. having regard to the expulsion of 'Médecins sans frontières' from Ethiopia,
- F. convinced that the resettlement programme is inspired by political motives, in particular the depopulation of regions that are controlled by the independence movements,
- G. pointing out that almost all the aid comes from the Western democracies and that much of this aid is made possible by the generosity of citizens of the European Community,
- H. drawing attention to the efforts made by the Commission of the European Communities and the Committee on Development and Cooperation of the European Parliament to ensure that Community aid actually reaches the victims,
- 1. Appeals to the Ethiopian Government to suspend immediately, for at least three months, the resettlement of people far from their place of origin, thus giving a committee of inquiry the opportunity to clarify:
- the living conditions in the North and the possibility of resettlement there,
- the situation in the resettlement areas,
- whether or not resettlement is taking place on a voluntary basis and whether or not families are being split up,
- 2. Calls on the Ethiopian Government to authorize the international aid agency, Médecins sans frontières France, to resume its previous activities in Ethiopia;
- 3. Calls on the Commission and the Council to undertake an immediate and thorough investigation of the utilization and irregularities in the distribution of Community aid to Ethiopia;
- 4. Will call for this aid to be suspended if it becomes clear that the Ethiopian authorities refuse to accept any monitoring of the distribution of Community aid intended to ensure that the aid reaches the victims of the famine;
- 5. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission, the Council and the Government of Ethiopia.

#### RESOLUTION

#### on the resettlement of the population in Ethiopia

- A. concerned, on the occasion of the expulsion of 'Médecins sans frontières' at the deterioration in the aid given to populations affected by drought and famine,
- B. wishing to contribute as a matter of priority to the rehabilitation of the regions affected by famine by relaunching agriculture,
- c. alarmed at the manner in which the population from the north has been resettled in the south

   a policy which has affected more than half a million inhabitants and had adverse effects on
   the mortality rate,

- D. anxious to respect both Ethiopia's national sovereignty and the application of fundamental human rights, beginning with the right to life, respect for family integrity and the right to freedom of movement,
- 1. Deplores the expulsion of 'Médecins sans frontières' by the Ethiopian authorities and requests that they urgently reconsider this measure which is likely to be prejudicial to the interests of the Ethiopian people by depriving them of valuable medical aid;
- 2. Stresses that neither Parliament, nor the Community as a whole, have given their agreement to the policy of resettling populations and calls for an immediate moratorium on the resettlement of the population in the south for a given period and requests that independent experts should be entrusted with the task of assessing land resources, health conditions and the real extent to which displaced persons can be accommodated and absorbed;
- 3. To this end, requests the European Community and its Member States to contact the Ethiopian authorities and to participate in aid programmes for resettling people in the south only when appropriate guarantees have been given and every effort has been made to enable the populations of the regions affected by famine to resettle in their regions;
- 4. Calls on the Commission to report back to it on any progress made on the matter before the departure of the Lomé III planning mission;
- 5. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Council, Commission and Ethiopian Government.
- 4. Angola
- Compromise amendment to Docs. B2-1332 and 1328/85

# RESOLUTION

on respect for the sovereignty of Angola

- A. whereas in the summer of 1984 the United States Congress repealed the Clark Amendment prohibiting CIA action in Angola,
- B. whereas, over the last few weeks, the President of the United States and his Secretary of State, Mr Schultz, have both expressed their willingness to reconsider granting substantial direct aid to UNITA, which, with the support of South Africa, is waging war against the Angolan Government in southern Angola,
- C. stressing, in particular, that on 24 November 1985 Mr Schultz stated on American television that the Reagan Administration supported UNITA's 'freedom fighting' and would rather act effectively through the CIA than back a proposal in Congress for \$27 million to be granted to UNITA in 'humanitarian aid',
- D. whereas, according to press reports, the Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs, Mr Chester Crocker, proposed a 'political settlement' in favour of UNITA at the American-Angolan talks which opened in Lusaka on 27 November 1985, whereby UNITA would be incorporated into a government coalition with the MPLA, which would organize the withdrawal of Cuban forces in exchange for American pressure for the withdrawal of the South African army from Namibia,

- Recalls that interference in a country's internal affairs and the destabilization of an internationally recognized government are contrary to international law, even if such measures are supported by a superpower capable of making any action brought under Chapter VII of the United Nations Charter totally ineffectual;
- Condemns any aid granted to UNITA by the Reagan Administration which is designed to destabilize an internationally recognized government;
- Calls on the governments of the Member States, the Commission and the Council to put their full weight behind Article 2 of the Third Lomé Convention, which stresses the importance of respect for the sovereignty of ACP partners and the right of each State to determine its own political, social, cultural and economic options;
- Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the EEC-ACP Council of Ministers, the United States and the Angolan Governments, the Commission, the Foreign Ministers of the Community meeting in Political Cooperation and the President of the Organization of African Unity.

## 5. European Foundation

#### RESOLUTION

#### on the European Foundation

- A. having regard to the agreement establishing a European Foundation signed by Belgium, Denmark, the FRG, Greece, France, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom in Brussels on 29 March 1982,
- B. having regard to its resolutions on the European Foundation of 17 June 1982 (1) and 28 October 1983 (2) and its resolution of 12 July 1985 on laying down the procedure for appointing those members of the Board of the European Foundation to be chosen by the Community (3);
- C. whereas the aim of the European Foundation is to promote understanding of the European ideal among the peoples of the Community, study the best way in which the Community countries may preserve and develop their cultural heritage, encourage language learning in the Community countries, encourage exchanges of people in the Community, promote an ideal which meets the interests and demands of the young and encourage the dissemination of European culture inside and outside the Community's borders,
- D. having regard to the impact which the achievement of these objectives would have on European public opinion, which would thereby have a specific yardstick by which to measure the progress achieved in building Europe,
- E. whereas not all the national parliaments, notably those of the FRG, the Netherlands and Belgium, have yet ratified the agreement of 29 March 1982,
- F. whereas more than 100 European intellectuals meeting in Madrid in October 1985 unanimously approved a 'Manifesto' in which they state, among other things, that there is an urgent need for the European Foundation established by the agreement of 29 March 1982 to be able to start work and thus take intergovernmental cultural decisions,

- G. having regard to the pressing nature of these problems and in the hope that they will be raised at the meeting of Community Culture Ministers on 20 December 1985, thus responding to the earnest requests addressed to them with regard to promoting a European cultural community,
- H. whereas the discussions on a People's Europe are concentrated on practical measures and initiatives to promote the European ideal among the citizens of Europe,
- 1. Requests the Ministers of Culture meeting on 20 December 1985 to conduct a fresh examination of the progress achieved in the procedure for ratifying the agreement of 29 March 1982 establishing the European Foundation;
- 2. Requests the national parliaments which have not yet ratified the agreement of 29 March 1982 to do so as soon as possible, in order to complete the tabling of the instruments of ratification so that, in pursuance of Article 26 thereof, the agreement may enter into force and the European Foundation may become operational as from the first meeting of its council;
- 3. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission and the Council.

Failing this, Parliament shall, after hearing one speaker in favour and one against, vote on the President's proposal by show of hands.
- 2. If at least one-tenth of the current Members of Parliament are opposed to the referral for a decision provided for in paragraph 1, this referral shall not take place and the request for an opinion or for advice shall be referred to the appropriate committee pursuant to Rule 32.
- 3. Where one-third of the members of the committee to which a request for an opinion or for advice has been referred pursuant to paragraph *1* request that the matter be referred back to Parliament, the procedure provided for in Rule 32 shall apply.
- 4. Where paragraph 1 is applied, all the rules concerning the public conduct of proceedings in Parliament shall apply to the meetings of the committee.

# Rule 33

- 1. The President, a minimum of 21 Members or a committee may propose to Parliament that a request for an opinion or for advice submitted purusant to Rule 32 be referred to the appropriate committee with the power to take a decision.
- 2. A decision shall be taken on this proposal at the beginning of the sitting following that during which Parliament was informed thereof. Parliament shall, if necessary after hearing one speaker in favour and one against, vote on the proposal. If at least one-tenth of the current Members of Parliament are opposed to the referral to committee for a decision, this referral shall not take place.
- 3. Where one-third of the members of the committee to which a request for an opinion or for advice has been referred pursuant to paragraph 2 request that the matter be referred back to Parliament, the procedure provided for in Rule 32 shall apply.
- 4. Where paragraphs 1 and 2 are applied, the usual rules governing discussions in committee shall apply. However, the committee meeting at which a decision is to be taken shall be open to the public; the agenda for this meeting, and any deadline for tabling amendments, shall be published in the EP Bulletin.

Notes, after considering the Council's statements and the modifications it made to Parliament's first reading and having heard the opinion of the Commission, that the draft budget does not cover the commitments entered into by the Community; once again amends the draft budget so as to ensure that the expenditure relating to enlargement and the 'cost of the past' is taken into account in such a way as to provide all Member States with the minimum necessary for the normal operation and development of the structural funds under the rules in force;
- 2. Notes that the exceptional expenditure which the Community will have to meet in 1986 to ensure that the commitments entered in previous budgets and those entered into vis-à-vis Spain and Portugal are honoured have no equivalent of the same nature in the 1985 budget; considers therefore that this expenditure is not subject to the Treaty provisions concerning the determination of the maximum rate of increase in non-compulsory expenditure in relation to expenditure of the same nature in the 1985 financial year; considers accordingly that the procedure laid down in Article 203 (9) of the Treaty providing for the fixing of a new rate of increase in non-compulsory expenditure is not applicable in the present instance;
- 3. Allocates part of its margin for manoeuvre under Article 203 (9) of the EEC Treaty to financing this expenditure on the basis of the appropriations earmarked for this purpose by the Council and at the same percentage as the latter;
- 4. Points out that the decision taken by the budgetary authority should result in a better balance between the different policies; with this in view, considers it vital for the objectives assigned to the structural funds to be fully implemented, as these will make it possible to integrate Spain and Portugal in the Community's financial mechanisms with effect from the next financial year;
- 5. Notes that the appropriations provided for the structural funds are insufficient to provide a real increase for the existing 10 Member States and to make an effective contribution to resolving the structural problems in Spain and Portugal; points out that the failure to increase the structural funds in real terms (for the 10 Member States) infringes the requirements of Article 11 (1) of the

regulation on the Integrated Mediterranean Programmes which foresees 'increases in real terms accruing to the funds' (from 1986 to 1992) that 'shall help to finance the IMP's, but without adversely affecting transfers from the Funds to other less prosperous and priority regions'; notes that, once again, Parliament has been forced to attempt, through its budgetary powers, to make Council fulfil obligations that Council itself created when it adopted legislation;

- 6. Will examine regularly during the financial year 1986, under an extended form of the 'Notenboom procedure' and in collaboration with the Commission, the conditions under which the 1986 budget is being implemented, so as to prevent the recurrence of the problem of the 'cost of the past' in future years; will also investigate, without prejudice to the subsequent discharge procedure, whether the implementation of the appropriations has been carried out in accordance with the rules in force, particularly as regards the provisions intended to reduce disparities with the Community and strengthen its cohesion;

- having regard to the proposals from the Commission to the Council (COM(85) 579 final).
- having been consulted by the Council pursuant to Article 126 of the EEC Treaty (Doc. C2-124/85),
- having regard to its resolutions of 17 May 1983 (¹), 30 March 1984 (²), 12 February 1985 (³) and 15 March 1985 (⁴),
- having regard to the opinion of the Committee on Social Affairs and Employment on the ratification of the treaties of accession between Spain and Portugal and the Community (5).
- having regard to the report by the Committee on Social Affairs and Employment (Doc. A2-161/85),
- having regard to the result of the vote on the Commission's proposal,
- 1. Notes that it is necessary to adapt the rules governing the European Social Fund with a view to the accession of Spain and Portugal, so that these two new Member States may benefit under this financial instrument as soon as they enter the Community;
- 2. Is perfectly aware of the difficulties encountered by the Commission in drawing up provisions for such adjustments, more especially in establishing which regions are to be considered as top priority, in view of the lack of reliable statistical data;
- 3. Nevertheless deplores the fact that the Commission has been so slow in submitting the abovementioned proposals, since this has meant that the parliamentary committee responsible has not been able to give careful consideration to the amendments in question;
- 4. Notes with regard to the proposed amendments that:
- (a) the budgetary proposals regarding the European Social Fund submitted by the Commission for 1986 to meet the needs of enlargement — 330 million ECU — are far from commensurate with the alarming situation in respect of employment in the acceding States and are inadequate for the aim of developing these countries, which must become an integral part of the Community,
- (b) the amended percentages of the appropriations intended for the top priority regions rather than other regions do not seem to be the result of a careful assessment of the situation in the regions concerned,
  - both because the definition of the regions characterized by a serious and prolonged imbalance in employment, laid down in Article 5 (2) of Decision 83/516/EEC, is not based on reliable data.
  - and because the percentage increase in appropriations proposed by the Commission does not seem to have taken into account the substantial increase in the working population 77 % which will be recorded in the top priority regions;
- 5. Considers that the budgetary proposals with a view to enlargement defeat the purpose of mobilizing and developing human resources and are inconsistent with those submitted for other Community funds;

- 6. Reiterates once again that the principle of concentration both geographically and qualitatively speaking of Social Fund aid is essential to make this instrument efficient, effective and stimulating, to avoid aid being scattered and wasted and prevent the mere transfer of resources:
- 7. Is therefore convinced that the participation of the two new Member States in the Fund calls for precise consideration of the guidelines, in order to ensure that in these countries priority is given to vocational training projects leading to development and providing incentives by virtue of their multiplying effect (e.g. the training of contractors and technicians for small and medium-sized undertakings, the training of training staff, researchers etc.);
- 8. Notes what the Commission stated in its explanatory memorandum on the proposed amendments, in particular that the volume of demand from the two new Member States will probably not at first be as great as that from the other Member States; wishes, however, to stress once again that the lack-of proportion between the number of applications submitted and the funds available is already considerable in 1985 applications for about 5 000 million ECU were submitted and must inevitably increase, which means that the management of the Fund will be less selective and less transparent.
- 9. Considers, in view of the abovementioned problems and the exceptional situation created by the accession of these two new States, that the Commission's proposal for an amendment to Article 7 (3) of Decision 83/516/EEC should be adopted for 1986 only and on condition that the Council increases the appropriations for the European Social Fund, as proposed by the European Parliament during the first reading;
- 10. Calls at the same time for a better and more precise definition of the Fund's aims by the end of 1986, hoping that this will help to solve the abovementioned problems in a spirit of Community solidarity, so that the European Social Fund may fulfil its role as an instrument to combat unemployment and boost economic recovery, looking beyond mere national interests;
- 11. Reserves the right to initiate the conciliation procedure if the Council should intend to depart from the provisions of paragraphs 9 and 10 of this resolution;
- 12. Instructs its President to forward to the Council and the Commission, as Parliament's opinion, the Commission's proposal as voted by Parliament and the corresponding resolution.

- D. having regard to the outcome of the ministerial conference held in Hanover on 5 and 6 November 1985.
- E. whereas 10 projects are currently deemed ready to be launched within the framework of Eureka,
- F. having regard to the know-how acquired by the Commission for promoting cooperation between undertakings within the Community and collaborating with other non-member countries.
- G. whereas the problem of the Commission's participation in Eureka has still to be resolved, as regards both the use of its services as a secretariat and its association with the different projects;
- H. whereas some of the projects which have apparently been agreed have already been the subject of discussions between undertakings from different Member States, while others relate to sectors already covered by research undertaken in the context of the Community framework programme, particularly within the framework of the Esprit programme,
- I. whereas there is still a danger that the smaller countries will remain on the fringes of the project, partly because of the relatively minor role that will probably be accorded to the Commission.
- J. whereas the next ministerial meeting will not be held until next year, probably in the United Kingdom,
- 1. Reaffirms its belief that only the establishment of a European technological community with the necessary resources and the appropriate institutional structure will enable Europe to compete successfully with the United States and Japan;
- 2. Considers that the Eureka project, in the form in which it is likely to develop, cannot be seen as a viable alternative to the creation of a European technological community, but can only represent one aspect of it;
- 3. Regrets that as yet the only projects adopted appear to be those submitted by undertakings in the Member States without specific reference to the Community's political objectives and with no real attempt to lay down coherent criteria;
- 4. Is concerned at the fact that the smaller Member States of the Community and other non-member countries will be able to play only a minor role;
- 5. Is afraid that duplication of existing Community programmes may lead to overlapping, waste and confusion;
- 6. Considers that Eureka must be organized in such a way as to ensure that the Commission plays an essential coordinating role in the political direction and management of the project;
- 7. Urges the Commission to submit to it a detailed written report of all ministerial meetings devoted to Eureka;
- 8. Urges the Commission to continue its preparatory work for a revision and extension of the framework programme to pave the way for a European technological community;
- 9. Insists also that the share of the Community budget allocated to research and technology be at least doubled during the next three financial years in accordance with the Commission's own guidelines;
- 10. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the governments of the States taking part in the Eureka Conference, the Council and Commission.

- C. having regard to the declaration of the European Council meeting in Milan on the creation of a European technological community and the decisions taken by the European Council on that subject in Luxembourg on 3 December 1985,
- D. having regard to its resolutions of 13 June (1) and 8 October 1985 (2),
- 1. Welcomes the Conference declaration that Eureka projects should be used for civil purposes;
- 2. Regrets in particular that no use has been made of the existing Community instruments and institutions for a common research and technology policy;
- 3. Expresses the criticism that agreements between individual states alone will not help ensure the achievement of the declared political goal of a comprehensive European policy on technology or create links with other Community policies or establish more effective parliamentary control:
- 4. Points out that the list of projects submitted by the Conference contains a number of projects already contained in the existing Community programmes or which could be carried out in that context including the possibility of cooperation with non-Community countries;
- 5. Fears, therefore, that Europe's research activities will be marked by further duplication, overlapping and waste of funds;
- 6. Takes the view that the decision to set up an independent Eureka secretariat must lead to conflict with the Commission and create more administrative bureaucracy;
- 7. Doubts whether Eureka, as conceived to date, will provide the anticipated impetus for technology, especially since some governments are not willing to make the necessary public funds available;
- 8. Fears that the smaller Member States and small businesses will be given only a minor role to play;
- 9. Regrets that the Commission appears to have placed insufficient emphasis at the ministerial conference on its earlier views concerning the Community's central role in the future European policy on technology;
- 10. Repeats, therefore, its demand that the Eureka project be incorporated into the Community framework and that the Commission should play a central coordinating role in its implementation;
- 11. Calls on the Eureka secretariat to be set up within the Commission;
- 12. Calls on the Commission to pursue its aim of doubling the share of the Community budget allocated to R & D over the next three years and to submit an extended framework programme of large-scale and strategic projects:
- 13. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the governments of the states taking part in the Eureka Conference, the Commission and the Council.

#### WRITTEN DECLARATION

#### on the treatment of the Jewish Community in Russia

The European Parliament,

- A. welcoming the forthcoming meeting of President Reagan and Mr Gorbachev with its offer of hope for the easing of tension between the USSR and the Western Nations including those in membership of the EEC,
- B. hoping that the Soviet Government will take this opportunity of honouring its signed commitment under the Helsinki Agreement on Cooperation and Security to guarantee basic Human Rights, especially Freedom of Religion and Freedom of Movement to all its citizens,

- C. conscious that any improved relationship between the East and West is dependent on new action by this Soviet Government in these fields,
- 1. Expresses its grave concern at the intensification of anti-semitism in the Soviet Press and Media,
- 2. Regrets that the number of Jews permitted to leave the Soviet Union has declined dramatically,
- 3. Calls on the Soviet Government to permit all Soviet Jews wishing to leave the Soviet Union for reunification with their families to do so without impediment,
- 4. Calls on the Soviet Government to cease the harassment and persecution of those Soviet Jews who have expressed a desire to leave the USSR,
- 5. Calls on the Soviet Government to give evidence of its new desire to cooperate with the Western Democracies by, as a minimum gesture, issuing exit visas to all Refuseniks who have been waiting for 10 years or more for permission to leave the USSR,
- 6. Requests the Soviet Government to abandon its policy of persecution of Jews in the Soviet Union who wish to observe and practise their own religion and culture, especially those who wish to teach the Hebrew language,
- 7. Instructs its President to send this Written Declaration to the President of the USSR, the Heads of Government of the 10 countries in the EEC and the Secretary-General of the United Nations.

#### RESOLUTION

# on the disposal of agricultural stocks

- A. whereas the Community has become a major world producer and exporter of certain essential agricultural products,
- B. whereas the world market for some of these products has become very depressed, and the consequent low world market prices have been a powerful disincentive to the development of agriculture in many third world countries, while adding to the burden of the budgetary costs of European Community exports,
- C. whereas stocks of surplus agricultural products are a severe and continuing strain on the Community budget,
- D. whereas disposal of these surpluses is necessary to relieve this burden in the long term,
- E. whereas destruction of food stocks is politically unacceptable to the citizens of the EEC,
- F. whereas it is essential to curtail the budgetary costs of these stocks at source, namely by the discouragement or prevention of surplus production,
- 1. Believes that, for surplus agricultural products, price guarantees and the availability of intervention should be restricted to an amount that is marketable at tolerable budgetary cost, taking into account the need for buffer stocks, improved quality of products, strategic exports and food aid, and that any production in excess of this amount should be disposed of at the producer's own risk;
- 2. Agrees, as a short term measure only, that the Commission should dispose of existing surplus stocks, at acceptable budgetary cost, to relieve the burden of present stocks on the budget, utilizing the uncommitted EAGGF funds available;
- 3. Endorses the disposal of agricultural stocks for clearly defined social purposes;

- 4. Encourages the Commission to make available financial assistance for non-government organizations to purchase agricultural stocks for food aid purposes and to make those stocks available to countries facing severe food shortage, on condition, that such sales do not discourage these countries' indigenous agricultural development;
- 5. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission and Council.

# RESOLUTION

# on the disposal of agricultural stocks

- A. whereas in its Green Paper on perspectives for the common agricultural policy the Commission itself stresses that 'the agricultural export vocation of the Community cannot be served by assimilating it to an instrument of surplus disposal; and the problems of the Third World, in which many millions of persons remain hungry, cannot in the long term be resolved by the agriculture of the developed countries', \_\_\_
- B. whereas Europe must therefore seek to avoid trying to resolve its agricultural overproduction crisis at the expense of the economies of other countries, particularly those of developing countries which are striving to achieve food self-sufficiency,
- C. whereas this is particularly relevant to the countries of the Sahel which have now achieved self-sufficiency in cereals and the Network for the Prevention of Food Crises in the Sahel has recommended that no further food aid in cereals should be sent which might enter into competition with local production or inter-African trade.
- 1. \_\_Stresses that Europe must seek solutions to the problem of agricultural surpluses other than exports or food aid;
- 2. Calls on the Commission to devise a support programme to back up the food self-sufficiency strategies drawn up by the developing countries:
- 3. Insists in particular on the current need to support the countries of the Sahel by dropping the food aid programmes scheduled for 1985-1986 and replacing them with financial aid for the purchase of crops and for agricultural trade between these countries;
- 4. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission and the Council.

#### RESOLUTION

### on the disposal of agricultural stocks

- A. having regard to the high level of agricultural stocks in the Community, particularly of butter, some 1,2 million tonnes of which are now in storage, and beef and veal, some 550 000 tonnes of which are now in storage,
- B. whereas despite major disposal schemes run by the Commission in the past year, butter stocks are now at the same high level as one year ago,
- C. having regard to the Commission's proposed schemes to reduce stocks of beef and in particular old butter by such measures as selling 175 000 tonnes of beef to the Soviet Union, selling 100 000 tonnes of butter more than 18 months old to India and the Soviet Union, selling 40 000 tonnes of this old butter to consumers for cooking and making available 100 000 tonnes of it as an ingredient for calf feed.
- D. having regard to public outcry at such disposal schemes, particularly when no structural measures are taken at the same time to limit stocks of these products,
- E. concerned at the possible effects on the economies of developing countries, and in particular their agriculture, of dumping surplus Community produce on their markets,
- F. convinced that the sale of old butter to the European consumer as cooking butter will not be appreciated by the consumer in the same way as, for example, previous Christmas butter schemes,
- G. whereas a comparison of the cost of different stock disposal schemes cannot be realistic unless the total cost of long-term storage is also considered,
- H. whereas the value of deep-frozen beef, for example, immediately falls by some 40 % when it is put into storage following intervention,
- 1. Notes that structural measures to contain production and intervention purchasing of milk, milk products and beef are needed to limit stocks of these products effectively;
- 2. Wonders once again whether the measures proposed by the Commission to date for containing milk production, such as the proposed European buying-up arrangements for milk, will be fully effective in bringing stocks of butter and skimmed milk powder down to acceptable levels in the future, particularly when account is taken of the need to protect the weaker areas in the Community; refers in this connection once again to its resolution of 11 October 1985 on the implementation of the dairy quota arrangements (1);
- 3. Agrees with the Commission that, as has also been indicated by the Court of Auditors, the disposal of butter by means of Christmas schemes has considerable budgetary implications, but also points out that schemes such as disposing of butter as animal feed are also very costly, since the cost of storage for several years has to be included in the costing;

- 4. Notes the Commission's refusal to run a Christmas butter scheme this year, but calls on it to withdraw its proposals for making butter available as an ingredient for calf feed, since this measure is socially completely indefensible;
- 5. Considers that the Commission should submit proposals to enable sections of the population of Europe that have little or no opportunity to eat butter or beef to buy them at reduced prices and that it should draw up detailed disposal schemes for this purpose in collaboration with the Member States;
- 6. Points out that measures of this kind will boost butter consumption without the butter first having to be stored for two years;
- 7. Calls on the Commission to provide comprehensive consumer information when old butter is sold for cooking, in order to prevent the butter from being used wrongly;
- 8. Considers that it can reluctantly approve the disposal schemes proposed by the Commission, with the exception of the incorporation of butter in calf feed, on the understanding that they are one-off measures and on condition that the Commission draws up a programme for selling butter and beef to poorer sections of the population in the Community (such as the elderly) at reduced prices and that it devises structural measures to limit stocks;
- 9. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission and the Council.

# on measures to promote butter sales and reduce the butter mountain

- A. having regard to the substantial stocks of butter and beef in the Community,
- B. whereas butter and beef can be stored only for a limited period without severe deterioration in quality,
- C. whereas exports from the Community are the most effective way of dealing with the surpluses on the European agricultural market,
- D. whereas exports generally provide the cheapest means of reducing surpluses in the Community,
- E. whereas past experience has shown that export of cut-price butter and beef to certain countries are consistently criticized by Community citizens who have to pay the full price,
- F. whereas experience has proved that cutting the price of butter and beef for the whole or part of the year increases sales on the Community market,
- G. having regard to the last Christmas butter sales, and the special measures carried out in Berlin,
- H. whereas it has been shown that the success of individual sales promotion campaigns depends to a large extent on choosing the right time to release the cut-price goods onto the market,

- whereas the cut in price must be obvious to the consumer if additional sales are to be achieved.
- J. convinced that the regulated sale of cheap butter and beef to the socially disadvantaged can lead to increased sales without disrupting the normal market,
- K. convinced of the need to take advantage of every real opportunity to increase sales of butter and beef and that the necessary resources should be made available for this purpose,
- L. whereas the Commission has decided not to carry out Christmas butter sales this year and embarked on its alternative sales of cheap butter fat much too late,
- M. having regard to the Commission's intention to mix old butter, which is no longer fit for human consumption, in feed for calves and pigs,
- N. convinced that special measures to reduce the butter and beef mountain can be justified only if, at the same time, every effort is made to find an effective and lasting solution to the problem of surpluses,
- 1. Calls on the Commission to submit to the European Parliament a detailed report on the options available as regards special sales of butter and beef, including the costs involved, the timetable and an assessment of the last Christmas butter sales and the butter sales in Berlin;
- 2. Calls on the Commission to take the necessary steps to achieve market equilibrium by the phased reduction of structural surpluses, while safeguarding farmer's incomes;
- 3. Calls on the Commission to continue to take full advantage of sales outlets on the world market in order to reduce butter and beef surpluses in the Community; welcomes the Commission's efforts in this direction:
- 4. Calls for agreement to be sought in GATT on the pricing of special export programmes;
- 5. Welcomes the fact that the Commission has extended the range of processing industries benefiting from sales of cheap butter from storage to other industrial sectors and calls on the Commission to create other outlets of this type; this also applies to the use of casein for industrial puposes;
- 6. Calls on the Commission to draw up, in cooperation with the Member States, a special programme for sales of cheap butter and beef to the socially disadvantaged in the Community, which is designed in such a way as not to disrupt the market;
- 7. Calls on the Commission to implement without delay its plan to extend the availability of butter from storage to small and medium-sized bakeries when the problem of effective controls has been solved, in order to remove the present unacceptable discrimination against small and medium-sized bakeries;
- 8. Calls on the Commission to bring its sales measures more into line with conditions on the regional and national markets and to improve its decision-making procedures and sales management so that it can respond rapidly and flexibly to new outlets as they arise and in agreement with the Member States;
- 9. Insists that, despite the generally higher costs, sales measures should take due account of the citizens of the Community and, in particular, those groups least able to afford butter and meat;
- 10. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission and the Council.

- Considers that Member States should be encouraged, within a Community framework, to promote the sale and consumption of beef, thus avoiding regular-intervention purchasing;
- Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission and Council.

on the results of the conciliation procedure with the Council on the proposal from the Commission of the European Communities for a Regulation instituting integrated Mediterranean programmes

- having regard to the Joint Declaration by the European Parliament, the Council and the Commission of 4 March 1975 on the setting up of a conciliation procedure (1),
- having regard to the proposal from the Commission to the Council (2),
- having been consulted by the Council pursuant to Articles 43, 127 and 235 of the Treaty establishing the European Economic Community (Doc. C2-18/85),

- having regard to its amendments to the Commission's proposals and its resolution, adopted on 13 June 1985 (1),
- having regard to the 'Common Approach' from the Council (Doc. C2-60/85),
- having regard to the results of the conciliation meeting held on 23 July 1985,
- -having regard to the Council's adoption on 23 July 1985 of Regulation (EEC) No 2088/85 concerning the Integrated Mediterranean Programmes (2),
- having regard to the report of the Committee on Regional Policy and Regional Planning (Doc. A2-166/85);
- Stresses first of all that the adoption of the Regulation on Integrated Mediterranean Programmes (IMPs) is a decision of great political importance since it finally allows measures to be implemented which have long been considered essential to the pursuit of the dual aim of remedying the structural backwardness of the regions concerned and adapting them to the new conditions created by the enlargement of the Community;
- Emphasizes that the Regulation which has been adopted confirms the Council's acceptance of the main criteria, except the financial ones already put forward by Parliament in its resolution of 14 March 1985 (3) and reiterated in its abovementioned opinion of 13 June 1985, which include the following:
- (a) an outline law giving the Commission broad powers in approving programmes,
- (b) the integration and coordination of various means and projects within the framework of proper regional planning,
- (c) regional and local authorities should be involved and given-responsibility,
- (d) at both the planning and implementation stages the IMPs should be consistent with common policies and other Community projects,
- (e) emphasis should be given to aid in sectors other than agriculture, subject to the inherent capacities for development in the regions concerned.
- (f) Community action should be flexible and adaptable to differing and changing situations,
- (g) an effort should be made to standardize and simplify procedures.
- (h) the regions to which the IMPs apply should be precisely laid down for each of the Member States concerned:
- Also welcomes the fact that the Council's text incorporates amendments adopted by the European Parliament concerning aid in the sectors of small and medium-sized undertakings, cooperatives, craft undertakings, new technologies, energy and bio-energy, and operations aimed at enhancing the value of human resources, with special reference to young people and women:
- Acknowledges that in addition to allowing a wide-ranging and frank political discussion with the Council, the conciliation procedure made it possible to incorporate in the Regulation rules on the principle of transparency of decisions on the IMPs, since decisions approving the programmes (Article 7, paragraph 6) and programme contracts (Article 9) are to be published in the Official Journal of the European Communities;
- Feels it must, however, strongly deplore the fact that once again the conciliation procedure has failed in its main purpose, which is to reconcile the positions of Parliament and the Council on points of major conflict — in this particular case, the financial implications of the Regulation;

- 6. Therefore strongly condemns the fact that it is precisely in the financial sphere that the Council has totally rejected the requests made by Parliament for an increase of 400 million ECU in the 'additional contribution' which was set at 1,6 billion ECU, and for a guarantee of the additional nature of the 2,5 billion ECU provided by the structural funds;
- 7. Reminds the Council of the heavy responsibilities involved in allocating resources which are 'insufficient' (1) to achieve the IMPs' stated objectives of global development;
- 8. Points out as a matter of principle that this allocation, decided on by the European Council meeting in Brussels on 29 and 30 March 1985, clearly conflicts with the budgetary powers which the EEC Treaty assigns jointly to the Council and Parliament;
- 9. Reaffirms that the correct exercise of these powers includes the undertaking to:
- (a) ensure that the resource provided by the structural funds are really 'additional', one of the aims being not to take resources away from the aid measures which the funds themselves finance in accordance with their institutional role, both in IMP areas and in non-IMP areas. For this purpose, provision must be made in the budget each year, in respect of each structural fund, for a special 'sub-heading' relating exclusively to structural fund resources intended for the IMPs...
- (b) see to it that the resources allocated to EEC financial instruments are doubled in real terms by 1992 (2);
- 10. Is convinced that these objectives are essential for the full implementation of the provision laid down in Article 11 (1), second subparagraph, of the IMP Regulation, which states explicitly: 'increases in real terms accruing to the funds during the period concerned (1986-1992) shall help to finance the IMPs but without adversely affecting transfers from the funds to other less prosperous and priority regions'; points out that any attempt to reduce structural fund resources or hold them stationary, and any insufficiency in such resources, are clearly in breach of Article 11 of the IMP Regulation;
- 11. Expresses its disapproval of the Commission's intention to make the IMPs replace some specific common measures for agricultural infrastructure due to expire at the end of 1985 (3). Therefore calls upon the Commission to carry on with these measures, which are of prime importance for the most backward agricultural regions, by making them part of the agricultural structure policy, thereby guaranteeing additionality of the funds allocated to the IMPs as specific supplementary resources (1 600 million ECU), at least as far as aid to the agricultural sector is concerned:
- 12. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Council, the Commission and the regional authorities of the areas covered by the IMPs.

# on protectionism in trade relations between the European Community and the United States of America

- having regard to the motion for a resolution tabled by Mr De Gucht (Doc. 2-809/84),
- having regard to the motion for a resolution tabled by Mr Fruh and others (Doc. 2-872/84),
- having regard to the motion for a resolution tabled by Mr Maffre-Baugé and others (Doc. 2-895/84),
- having regard to the motion for a resolution tabled by Mr Moorhouse (Doc. 2-1020/84).
- having regard to the motion for a resolution tabled by Mr Piquet and others (Doc. 2-1469/84),

- having regard to the communication of the Commission to the Council 'Perspectives for the Common Agricultural Policy' (4),
- A. recalling the common cultural, political and economic foundations of the European Community and the United States of America,
- B. recognizing that international trade liberalization and increases in international trade flows contribute to the optimum allocation of economic resources and strengthen therefore both production and employment,
- C. concerned at the spreading of restrictions to international trade, in particular of measures providing for international market sharing,
- D. having regard to the increasingly protectionist policy of the USA towards imports from the EEC, and particularly steel imports, and the resulting burden placed on relations between the USA and the European Community,
- E. noting that the economic costs of protectionist measures have been clearly outlined both in the GATT special report of March 1985 'Trade policies for a better future' and in the report 'Costs and benefits of protective measures', adopted by the OECD Economic Policy Committee in March 1985; that such costs are usually higher than the short term benefits which can be obtained.

- F. having regard to the conclusions of the OECD Council meeting at ministerial level of 11 April 1985 (¹), to the resolution of the European Parliament of 18 April 1985 protesting against escalating protectionism by the USA against Community Steel imports, to the Bonn Economic Summit of 4 May 1985, to the declaration of protest of 17 October 1985 by the EEC Council Ministers concerning relations with the USA in the iron and steel sector, and to the steel agreement concluded on 10 December 1985 between the US and the EC,
- 1. Stresses the importance of a balanced development of EC-US trade, in order to strengthen world trade flows, defend the open multilateral trade system and reinforce economic recovery;
- 2. Points out that the EC-US balance of trade has for years shown a surplus in favour of the US and that only since 1984 has there been talk of a relatively limited deficit, and that on the other hand the American trade deficit caused by Japanese imports shows a rising trend as a result of structural factors and in relative terms is much greater than the deficit with the EC;
- 3. Declares that trade disputes between the US and the EC must be resolved first and foremost within GATT and that GATT procedures must be waived only in exceptional cases in order to prevent an escalation of unilateral action by means of bilateral political agreements;
- 4. Proposes that, to examine thoroughly and deal expertly with acute trade and economic problems between the EC and USA, small parliamentary groups of experts should meet with their counterparts in the American Congress, these meetings to take place outside the annual meetings between delegations from the European Parliament and the US Congress;
- 5. Stresses that, if the GATT rules are not respected by the US, the Council should take all the necessary retaliatory measures, as it resolved to do in its declaration of 27 March 1985;
- 6. Calls on the Commission to devise and implement trade policy measures such as will effectively and swiftly defend the Community's legitimate interests;

# Concerning the industrial sector:

- 7. Is deeply concerned at the growing compartmentalization of the steel market as a result of the bilateral US-EC agreements reached under pressure from the US and draws attention to the high economic costs of these agreements to both the American consumer and European steelworkers and producers;
- 8. Strongly opposes the US call for imports of semi-finished steel products from Europe also to be limited; considers on the contrary that efforts must be made to liberalize the existing steel agreements (including the carbon steel agreement, which expires at the end of 1985), particularly since the Community arrangements for subsidizing the restructuring of the European steel industry expire on 1 January 1986;
- 9. Expects the US Administration to establish a special arrangement to supplement the planned EEC voluntary restraint agreement, to cover US subsidiaries of European steel undertakings, to ensure that this European commitment in the USA does not fall victim to US protectionism over steel and that jobs are not lost in a structurally weak US region;
- 10. Is deeply concerned by the US textile bill, now before Congress, which, even if not aimed directly at the EC, would have negative consequences on trade in textile products and reinforce, at world level, the trend towards protection of national markets; points out that such action would also undermine confidence in exporting countries as concerns renegotiation of the MFA;

- Welcomes President Reagan's decision not to limit US footwear imports, and hopes that the strong declarations of the US President against protectionism will be reflected in the US legislative process;
- Calls on its parliamentary counterparts in the US not to jeopardize the current preparation for new multilateral trade talks (GATT round), originally proposed by the US, by adopting protectionist measures:
- Notes that the special procedures operated by the US in connection with the protection of industrial property lead to de facto discrimination against foreign patent-holders since where there is disagreement over industrial property between a US firm and a foreign firm, and pending the outcome of the judicial procedure, the foreign products concerned can be kept off the US market;

Concerning the agriculture sector:

- Notes that EC-US trade relations in the agriculture sector are subject to recurrent crises, and considers that a permanent settlement on outstanding problems should be found by means of strengthened GATT discipline as concerns agricultural products;
- Strongly disapproves the unilateral action taken by the US in the case of the citrus fruit dispute: it is however, evident that a stable solution will have to be found to the issues concerned, and in particular a common interpretation of GATT Article XXIV (which admits derogations from the most-favoured nation principle in order to establish free-trade-zones and customs unions); remarks in this context on the inability of existing GATT procedures for dispute settlement to solve the problem;
- Deplores the adoption of unilateral measures to reduce trade in agricultural products that could trigger off a dangerous spiral of reciprocal reprisals, as pointed out in its resolution of 11 July 1985 on EEC-United States agricultural trade (1);
- Strongly deplores the increase in United-States taxes on Community pasta products, and points out that that decision coincides with the end of a period of truce during which the Community made every possible attempt to reach an agreement on citrus fruit and pasta, for instance by reducing export refunds on pasta;
- Points out in this connection that it would be advisable to ensure that the 1974 Casey-Soames' compromise is adhered to;
- Recalls its resolution of 12 April 1984 (2), calling for a simultaneous process in the US and the EC in order to obtain 'the synchronized abolition of surplus production and subsidies, as a means of combating the root causes of the trade conflict';
- Demands that the United States observe the principles set out in the GATT statutes and avoids the tendency towards bilateralism; believes, too, that it is essential that problems faced by agricultural exporters be settled in a multilateral framework;
- Considers that both the US and the EC agricultural policies should take account to a greater extent of conditions on world markets and that the future GATT rounds should aim at some liberalization of trade in agricultural products;
- Considers, in this context, that the 1955 GATT waiver (enabling the US to pursue domestic policies regardless of certain GATT dispositions), the US export subsidies programme, and the CAP system of variable levies and refunds should be discussed in the next multilateral trade negotiations of GATT;

- 23. Hopes that talks will be initiated among the exporting countries with a view to working out a concerted policy on marketing and subsidies, while ensuring that consumers' food requirements are adequately covered and normal operating conditions for farming are guaranteed; is of the opinion that the Community must examine the means of reaching a more equitable understanding with the USA to open up the American market to European agricultural products (especially dairy products) and thereby offset the growing volume of the imported American agricultural products sold duty-free in Europe;
- 24. Acknowledges the efforts which the Community is currently making to reduce protectionism and reform the common agricultural policy; and asserts in particular that the problems of American agriculture do not result from the Community's aggressive commercial approach on world markets;

# Concerning financial aspects:

- 25. Points out the protectionist measures proposed by the Congress will do nothing to remove the cause of the large American balance-of-trade deficit, i.e. the deterioration of America's competitive position as a result of the high level of the dollar;
- 26. Stresses that a protectionist answer in the US to the growing trade deficit and external debt would delay the gradual fall of the dollar and the necessary adjustments in production, trade flows and capital movements;
- 27. Believes that the large US budget deficit is at the root of the considerable influx of foreign capital into the US, pushing up interest rates and the level of the dollar; therefore strongly urges the US Congress to reduce the budget deficit;
- 28. Stresses that the disorganized state of the International Monetary System has contributed to the current trade difficulties especially for the underdeveloped countries and to the threat of a revival of protectionism;
- 29. Considers consequently that it is the Community's task in its dialogue with the United States to prompt a greater awareness on the part of the American Government of its responsibilities as a dominant economic force in the functioning of the International Monetary System, which is indissolubly linked with the development of world trade;

# In conclusion:

- 30. Reaffirms its belief that protectionism does not provide any lasting economic advantage to the State resorting to it, and is particularly misleading as the political debate rarely succeeds in making clear to the public the economic costs of protectionist measures and the way that revenue distribution between producers, workers and consumers will be affected by them;
- 31. Is concerned by the gradual weakening of the GATT open multilateral trade system, caused notably by the proliferation of 'orderly marketing agreements' and 'voluntary restraints', and maintains that US-EC trade relations are of fundamental importance for the defence of free trade;
- 32. Considers that the search for reasonable compromises on matters still in progress, and the rejection of full further protectionist measures are vital prerequisites as far as the Community is concerned for the opening of a new round of GATT trade negotiations;
- 33. Considers that, in view of the new GATT-round, special consideration should be given also to the following points, which are highly significant for the future of US-EC trade relations:
- (a) tightening and clarification of the subsidies code (both for domestic and export subsidies),
- (b) tightening of GATT discipline for the agricultural sector,
- (c) improvement to the dispute settlement procedures in GATT;

34. Points out that the issue of US export controls on grounds of national security reasons will be dealt with in the report by the Committee on External Economic Relations concerning restrictions on exports of strategic products and transfers of technology;

#### RESOLUTION

#### on the future of Unesco

- having regard to the motion for a resolution on the future of Unesco (Doc. 2-891/84).
- having regard to the motion for a resolution on the funding of Unesco (Doc. 2-1299/84),
- having regard to motions for a resolution on the withdrawal of certain Member States from Unesco (Docs. 2-1306/84 and 2-1374/84),
- having regard to the motion for a resolution on a financial contribution from the European Economic Community to Unesco (Doc. B2-200/85),
- having regard to the resolution adopted by the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe on the subject of Unesco (¹),
- having regard to the statement by the Foreign Ministers of the Ten on 29 April 1985 on the question of Unesco,
- having regard to the report of its Committee on Youth, Culture, Education, Information and Sport (Doc. A2-172/85);
- A. recalling that Unesco's purpose under its Constitution is 'to contribute to peace and security by promoting collaboration among the nations through education, science and culture...',
- B. recalling also that, to realize this purpose, Unesco is mandated 'to collaborate in the work of advancing the mutual knowledge and understanding of peoples, through all means of mass communication and to that end to promote the free flow of ideas by word and image ...', 'to give fresh impulse to popular education and to the spread of culture ...' and 'to maintain, increase and diffuse knowledge ...',
- C. conscious of the extensive and valuable work carried out by Unesco in pursuit of its aims.
- D. recognizing that interpretations of Unesco's mandate and priorities are likely to differ in an organization with world-wide membership, and that some change in Unesco's role since its foundation was inevitable,
- E. concerned nevertheless at the scale of controversy surrounding certain Unesco activities in recent times and conscious of the validity of the Western criticism levelled against the Agency as regards the management of resources, particularly in the general secretariat, and the lack of balance in many of its projects,
- F. convinced that the fact of universality could make Unesco a unique forum for East-West and North-South dialogue in its spheres of competence,
- G. concerned that the withdrawal of the United States of America and the United Kingdom from Unesco detracts from the Agency's universality and places it in financial difficulty,
- 1. Stresses its commitment to the ideals enshrined in Unesco's Constitution and in particular to the principle of free flow of ideas by word and image;

- 2. Insists that foremost among the principles to be upheld is the denial of a monopoly control of the mass media whether by state or private organizations;
- 3. Considers that activities which have given rise to widespread criticism over the last few years must in future be avoided, and takes the view that, in a spirit of tolerance and recognition of political, denominational, cultural and scientific diversity, Unesco must avoid accepting tasks which lead to one-sided political polarization;
- 4. Calls for greater decentralization of Unesco's work and would like to see greater emphasis placed on operational activities in the field, and less on politically sensitive studies and standard-setting work at Headquarters;
- 5. Takes the view that Unesco must given priority to its technical and pragmatic functions which fulfil basic needs, such as combating illiteracy, improving communication infrastructures, training research workers, journalists and communications specialists, restoring historic monuments etc;
- 6. Takes the view that, as regards communication policy, the freedom of the press and information and the freedom of expression across national frontiers must not be jeopardized and any monopoly of information must be avoided and welcomes the appointment of the 18-person Temporary Committee to supervise the implementation of reforms as set out in the detailed timetable of reforms approved in Sofia;
- 7. Stresses the continuing need for a thorough reform of the administration of Unesco, notably in the fields of staffing, the reduction of administrative costs in favour of projects and the review of the expenditure of the General Secretariat, and calls especially for greater budgetary clarity;
- 8. Notes the positive measures decided upon by recent sessions of the General Conference and Executive Board of Unesco and calls for more far-reaching measures along the same lines;
- 9. Urges the Director-General to ensure prompt and thorough implementation of the reforms agreed to by its governing bodies;
- 10. Underlines the need for fundamental and continuing review of the activities of Unesco to ensure that they comply with Article 1 of its Constitution, particularly as regards the free flow of information, and of the United Nations system as a whole;
- 11. Stresses the importance of ensuring that the representation of Western Member States at sessions of Unesco's governing bodies and at intergovernmental meetings convened under Unesco's auspices is of sufficiently high calibre;
- 12 Calls for closer consultation between governments, non-governmental organizations at national and international levels, and the Secretariat in defining areas of action and priorities for Unesco;
- 13. Recognizes that the USA and the United Kingdom have made a major financial and intellectual contribution to Unesco since its foundation, and hopes that conditions can be created enabling these two countries to resume membership at an early opportunity;
- 14. Calls for more sustained cooperation between the European Community and Unesco in areas of mutual interest, provided that positive developments occur within Unesco;
- 15. Instructs its President to forward this resolution and the report of its committee to the Foreign Ministers of the Member States of the European Community, to the Commission of the European Communities and to the Director-General of Unesco.

# 13. Fishery problems in the context of enlargement — Enforcement of the Common Fisheries Policy

### RESOLUTION

on problems and prospects in the fisheries sector in the context of the enlargement of the Community

The European Parliament,

- having regard to the motion for a resolution by Mr Guermeur, on behalf of the Group of the European Democratic Alliance, on the need to conserve fish stocks in Community waters at all costs (Doc. 2-751/84),
- having regard to the motion for a resolution by Mr MacSharry and others, on behalf of the Group of the European Democratic Alliance, on Spanish accession and fisheries (Doc. 2-885/84),
- having regard to the report of the Committee on Agriculture, Fisheries and Food (Doc. A2-145/85):
- A. having regard to the imminent entry of Spain and Portugal into the Community and the new situation which will result, particularly for the fisheries sector,
- B. whereas the enlargement of the Community to include Spain and Portugal represents a challenge to the European fisheries sector which should be met by positive vigorous and long-term measures,
- C. whereas it is important to ensure that all fishermen of the future enlarged Community respect the provisions of the Treaty of Accession relating to fishing so that the principle of 'relative stability', which forms the basis of the common fisheries policy and secures the conservation of fish stocks in Community waters, is not undermined,
- D. whereas the Community can therefore no longer avoid implementing a common policing policy in the fisheries sector,
- E. whereas, moreover, enlargement should allow the Community to frame and implement a fisheries policy on a global scale instead of limiting its diplomatic activity to regional agreements,
- F. whereas the Community should actively assist the Member States to cope with the social upheaval that enlargement will inevitably cause,
- G. having regard, on the other hand, to the Community's duty to show solidarity with Spain and Portugal and, in particular, the vital need to help the future Member States to meet their new obligations,
- H. having regard to its resolution of 13 December 1985 on enforcement of the common fisheries policy, and in particular the proposals for an immediate increase in controls on sea fishing and in the powers of inspectors.

# I. GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

- 1. Considers that enlargement could offer opportunities to the Community's fishing industry, which entails:
- (a) strengthening its policing methods,
- (b) establishing a structural policy backed up by substantial financial resources,
- strengthening the common markets policy and adapting more effectively to economic realities.

- (d) maintaining a higher profile outside Community waters,
- (e) extending fully the common fisheries policy to the Mediterranean in agreement with all the adjoining countries as regards the conservation of resources,
- (f) setting up a social policy in the fisheries sector to absorb the inevitable economic upheavals arising from enlargement;
- 2. Stresses that the future Member States, whose *per capita* fish consumption is almost three times the Community average, represent a potential market of 50 million consumers which opens up new prospects for the Community fisheries sector;
- 3. Takes the view also that membership could offer Spain and Portugal an opportunity to adapt and modernize their fishing fleets with the Community's assistance and thus to ease the economic and social tensions which would have occurred in any case, given the reduced catch possibilities in European waters;
- 4. Considers therefore that enlargement can offer mutual advantages to the parties concerned which must be preserved in the interests of all the fishermen of the future enlarged Community, on the express condition that the Community adapts catch capacities to the essential need to conserve stocks in Community waters;
- 5. Considers that enlargement should be a trigger for the introduction of a policy to extend Community fishing into the waters of third countries, with which agreements should be concluded;

# II. A COMMUNITY POLICING POLICY

- 6. Considers it essential in the light of past experience and the present situation to devise and introduce a bolder Community policing policy to ensure strict observance of the provisions of the Accession Treaty in the fisheries sector and, with this end in view, to request the Spanish and Portuguese Governments straight away to make preparations for strict application of that Treaty:
- 7. Takes the view that this Community policing policy should hinge on the following measures:
- (a) improving and strengthening controls carried out by Member States.
- (b) increasing the number and strengthening the powers of Community inspectors.
- (c) strengthening the Member States' naval and air policing facilities, where necessary with Community assistance,
- (d) establishment of regional maritime surveillance centres with the task of coordinating maritime inspection and surveillance operations carried out by the Member States for the Community; each of these centres would be responsible for a fishing zone formed by all or part of the waters of several Member States.
- (e) establishment of a Community maritime surveillance coordination centre to take responsibility for Community inspection and to centralize and make use of the data gathered by the regional centres described above, the Community inspectors and the national administrations:
- 8. Urges that all data should be centralized at the Community surveillance service, for whom the inspectors work;
- 9. Stresses, however, that these measures should only be a first step towards the creation of a Community fisheries control service which is the only means of ensuring effective and non-discriminatory policing, as the Member States do not always have the political will to fulfil their responsibilities with regard to the implementation and enforcement of Community law;
- 10. Calls, for similar reasons, on the Member States to introduce in their national legislation identical provisions defining offences, governing prosecution and providing for penalties so that the Community's fishermen are treated in the same way everywhere;

- 11. Enjoins the Commission to report each year to the Council and the European Parliament on:
- (a) the maritime inspection and surveillance operations carried out by the Community, either through its inspectors or by the competent services in its Member States,
- (b) the number of contraventions, prosecutions and penalties imposed on offenders, this information being broken down by Member State,
- (c) progress achieved towards implementation of the Community policing policy as described above:

# III. A HIGHER INTERNATIONAL PROFILE

- 12. Considers that enlargement offers the Community a new opportunity to make its presence felt in most of the world's oceans, bearing in mind that the fishery agreements signed by Spain and Portugal with numerous third countries must be renegotiated by the Community;
- 13. Stresses that it is vital for the Community to take over Spain and Portugal's fisheries agreements as fully as possible to allow as many Spanish and Portuguese vessels as possible to continue their activities outside Community waters and to open up new areas to the fishermen of the Community of Ten, not only to ensure that fishing habits are not disrupted but also to ease as far as possible the pressure on the fish stocks in Community waters;
- 14. Draws attention to the appreciably different nature of the Community's fishing agreements and those of Spain and Portugal, and hopes that the scale of compensation offered by the Community will be increased;
- 15. Takes the view that when the Community renegotiates these agreements, it should not lose sight of its own philosophy, i.e.
- (a) for its own fishermen: to ensure that they have catch opportunities outside Community waters, having regard to the restrictive TAC and quota policy within Community waters,
- (b) for developing countries and in accordance with the Lomé Convention to regard the fishery agreements as an instrument of cooperation making it possible:
  - (i) to recognize, assess, defend and manage the fishery resources established by the III International Conference on the Law of the Sea in particular by establishing 200-mile exclusive economic zones,
  - (ii) to establish a fishing industry in these countries covering all stages from catching to processing in order to provide jobs and to supply protein,
  - (iii) to train people for such work which is generally neglected by the developing countries,
  - (iv) to improve the scientific knowledge of the developing countries not only for their own waters, but also within the region of which they are part,
- (c) for developed countries: to view the fisheries agreement as a source of economic activity and employment and an instrument of technological and commercial cooperation;
- 16. Takes the view that the Community should seek to conclude fisheries agreements with countries in areas where it is hardly represented at present such as the South Atlantic or Pacific Ocean, by providing technical and financial incentives for joint ventures;
- 17. Calls on the Commission also to intensify experimental fishing projects with a view to discovering and then exploiting new fishing zones or marketing species of which only small-quantities have been consumed hitherto in the Community;
- 18. Enjoins the Commission, in cooperation with the developing countries, to study new reciprocal concessions, in the framework of fisheries agreements, such as technical assistance and financial aids for the acquisition of maritime inspection and surveillance equipment by these countries to assist them to protect their fish stocks against the systematic depredation campaigns by the fleets of certain third countries;

19. Stresses emphatically that, with Spain, France, Italy and Greece, the Community will in future have an extensive Mediterranean seaboard; considers that it should take advantage of this situation to conclude fisheries agreements with all the Mediterranean countries in the interest of all the riparian states and does not rule out the possibility of a common organization for sea fishing in this area where the present anarchic exploitation poses a threat to resources;

#### IV. REVISION OF THE COMMON FISHERIES POLICY.

20. Takes the view that the basic principles of the common fisheries policy should be maintained but that its instruments should be adapted;

# (A) COMMON ORGANIZATION OF THE MARKET

- 21. Calls on the Commission to take appropriate steps to
- (a) maintain and, as far as possible, increase the incomes of Community fishermen, in particular with regard to sensitive species, and, in particular, those not yet covered by CMO,
- (b) facilitate trade between Member States in such a way as to ensure that the principle of a single market is fully implemented.
- (c) protect this market against the dangerous imports from low-wage countries outside the Community so as to achieve genuine Community preference by rigorous adherence at Member State level to the rules currently in force.
- (d) maintain, in particular with regard to preserved fish, the processing industries located in the present Community of Ten, which are already in jeopardy, having regard to the differences in production costs between the Member States, and countries with low social costs;

# (B) TECHNICAL MEASURES

22. Requests the Commission to amend the existing regulations, with the agreement of the fishing industry, in such a way as to prevent disputes and lost catches arising from incompatible fishing methods by designating areas open only to long-liners and trawlers respectively;

# (C) STRUCTURAL POLICY

- 23. Considers that the present structural policy should be revised to take into account:
- (a) the over-capacity of the Spanish fishing fleet,
- (b) the considerable age of the Portuguese fishing fleet and the lack of producer organizations in Portugal,
- (c) its inadequacy in the face of the current needs of the Community's fishing fleet;
- 24. Takes the view in particular that this policy should be defined in more flexible and less restrictive terms, easing the current strict limits on Community financing of shipbuilding, in particular those relating to the length of vessels, and introducing new criteria suited to the conservation of resources and safeguarding employment; calls urgently for the 33-metre limit, which has served its purpose in the past, but which is no longer relevant to the requirements of the post-accession Common Fisheries Policy, to be abolished;
- 25. Stresses the importance of fisheries in the context of the Integrated Mediterranean Programmes and requests that due consideration be given to measures to modernize structures and infrastructures in the sector when drawing up the projects;

# (D) TRADE POLICY

26. Stresses that the accession of Spain and Portugal provides the Community with the opportunity to clarify its position on the trade policy required in the fish products sector;

- 27. Points out in particular that accession will create difficulties for the countries and particularly the Mediterranean countries that export fish preserves, and that a solution should be found so that these countries are not penalized by the membership of two new Member States:
- 28. Requests also that during future GATT negotiations fisheries should not be sacrificed to benefit other sectors;
- 29. Calls on the Commission to study without delay all aspects of a trade policy in the fish products sector and calls on its competent committees, in cooperation with the Commission, to submit a report on this subject, taking into account the special nature and extent of the fisheries agreements concluded by Spain and Portugal with third countries which are to be taken over by the Community;

# (E) SOCIAL POLICY

- 30. Enjoins the Commission to make an inventory of the social measures in Member States for fishermen and for persons working in allied industries (shipyards, fish processing, etc.);
- 31. Requests that, once this inventory has been completed, Articles 117 and 118 of the EEC Treaty should be implemented in order to harmonize the social security systems for the occupations involved in view of the fact that divergent national social policies are a factor in the distortion of competition which is unacceptable in a common market based on the principles of a single market, Community preference and financial solidarity:
- 32. Considers that social measures must be urgently applied to maintain the standard of living in the regions of the Member States which are heavily dependent on fisheries and which may be seriously affected as a result of the excess capacity in the Spanish and Portuguese fleets;

These measures must take account of:

- (a) the loss of jobs directly linked with fisheries,
- (b) the loss of jobs indirectly linked with fisheries.
- (c) the possibility of finding employment in sectors other than fisheries in these regions;
- 33. Calls on the Commission to submit proposals for strenthening market policy and structural policy;

# V. FINAL COMMENTS

- 34. Calls on the Commission and the Member States, including Spain and Portugal, to launch an immediate information campaign aimed at their fishermen and the general public so that the need for strict catch discipline is understood;
- 35. Enjoins the Commission to take action against any laxity and any practices that could encourage fraud and in particular to remind Member States of their responsibilities and obligations in this respect as members of the Community;
- 36. Calls on the Commission to act as swiftly as possible to establish the contacts and take the measures needed to take advantage of the expertise still available in the national administrations of Spain and Portugal to help its services in taking over or renegotiating these countries' fishery agreements and thus to help the Community to draw up and conclude the best possible fishing agreements with the many third countries which have not concluded such agreements;
- 37. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission, the Council and the governments of Spain and Portugal.

#### RESOLUTION

# on enforcement of the Common Fisheries Policy

- having regard to the motion for a resolution tabled by Mr Guermeur and others on fishery protection in the Community (Doc. 2-1001/84),
- having regard to Council Regulation (EEC) No 2057/82 (¹) establishing certain control measures for fishing activities by vessels of the Member States,
- having regard to Council Regulation (EEC) No 170/83 (2) establishing a Community system for the conservation and management of fishery resources,
- having regard to the report of the Committee on Legal Affairs and Citizens' Rights and the opinion of the Committee on Agriculture, Fisheries and Food (Doc. A2-162/85),
- A. whereas the success or failure of the Common Fisheries Policy depends to a large extent on the effective enforcement of its legislative provisions, particularly in regard to the control of catches in Community waters,
- B. whereas the responsibility for enforcement is currently in the hands of the fishing inspectorates of the Member States, with the Commission's role being confined to supervising the activities of these inspectorates with the aid of a Community fishing inspection team of 13 inspectors,
- C. whereas, to date, very little information on the activities of these Community inspectors has been made public,
- D. whereas the impending accession of two new Member States to the Community on 1 January 1986 will practically double the Community's fishing fleet at a stroke and may require a dramatic improvement of the supervision of fishing activities in Community waters and cause a concomitant increase in the workload of the Commission in this area,
- E. having regard to its resolution of 13 December 1985 on problems and prospects in the fisheries sector in the context of enlargement and believing that it complements this resolution.
- 1. Welcomes the Commission's decision to propose the necessary amendments to the enforcement regulations in order *inter alia* to enable Community inspectors to attend inspections being carried out without it being necessary to establish 'a mutually acceptable programme of inspections' and to oblige the Member States to assist all such 'non-notified visits' but regrets that Parliament has not been consulted on the proposal to amend Regulation 2057/82;
- 2. Calls upon the Commission to issue clear and comprehensible guidelines for the practical application of the right of hot pursuit which fishing inspection vessels enjoy under international law;
- 3. Reminds the Commission of its duty to forward an annual report on the application of measures taken pursuant to Regulation (EEC) No 170/83 to the Council and the European Parliament and to carry out its obligations under Article 156 of the EEC Treaty in a proper manner;
- 4. Calls upon the Commission to supply the Parliament with information on:
- national control procedures,

- Commission action on harmonizing national inspection methods and procedures,
- the inspection infrastructure of each of the Member States concerned, and
- national legislative provisions for ensuring respect of Community fishing provisions;
- 5. Calls upon the Commission to give serious and urgent consideration to the possibility of imposing hard-hitting sanctions on Member States whose fishing fleets consistently and flagrantly disregard the conservation requirements, and in particular to the feasibility of reducing the amount of one more species of fish which a Member State can take over a specified period;
- 6. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission, the Council and the Member States

# 14. Coordination of Community aid to third countries

- Doc. A2-130/85

#### RESOLUTION

# on the coordination of Community aid to third countries

- A. having regard to the special report of the Court of Auditors on the coordination of Community aid to third countries (1),
- B. having regard to the report of the Committee on Budgetary Control (Doc. A2-130/85);
- 1. Emphasizes that if development aid is to be rendered more effective there must be:
- close cooperation between all donors (and recipients) in formulating their development aid policy,
- genuine coordination in implementing these policies,
- a pooling of the lessons derived from the analysis of project assessments;
- 2. Notes that, for its development aid, the Community has to a large extent opted for a formula based on the joint financing of projects in cooperation with international or non-governmental organizations and also with Community Member States;
- 3. Notes that this formula, which makes it possible to carry out projects on a larger scale, requires perfect coordination at all levels between all the participants if it is to prove effective;
- 4. Takes note of the fact that new procedures have been instituted both by the Council resolution of 5 June 1984 and by the Third Lomé Convention with a view toimproving the coordination of aid financed jointly by the Community and the Member States, with particular reference to the assessment of results; notes, however, that, with regard to project selection and implementation, coordination is provided only in one direction, i.e. from the Commission to the Member States;
- 5. Notes that the isolated cases of poor coordination between the Commission and the EIB highlight an excessively formal division of sectors of activity between these two institutions;

- 6. Deplores notably the fact that in the case of certain agro-industrial projects in which the agricultural aspects are managed by the Commission and the industrial aspects by the EIB, the two institutions have acted totally independently, an attitude which is prejudiciable to the implementation of consistent projects;
- 7. Considers that the role of the Commission delegations is essential to ensure coordination of aid with the recipient countries, particularly in order to check that the necessary requirements and infrastructure are available and to supervise the implementation of projects;
- 8. Regrets the fact that lack of coordination between Commission departments can still sometimes give rise to delays and reduced effectiveness;
- 9. Welcomes the importance given by the Community, particularly after the report by the Court of Auditors, to improving the coordination of development aid, and recommends the following measures:
- the preparation of a compendium of all the assessment factors employed by the bodies responsible for development aid;
- reducing as far as possible the obligations imposed on recipient countries in return for a project;
- the setting up, on a pragmatic basis, of working parties bringing together the various donors to examine regularly the various stages of implementation of projects between initial conception and final assessment.
- 10. Considers, however, that the pooling of resources with the aim of improving the effectiveness of aid can, in the case of the Community and the Member States, take a different form than that of joint financing on a project-by-project basis and instructs its Committee on Development and Cooperation to study the possibility of extending Community responsibility for such aid;
- 11. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission and the Council.

# 15. Level of ECSC financial reserves

### RESOLUTION

# on the establishment, use and amount of the ECSC reserves

- having regard to the 'new approach to the financing of social measures in connection with the restructuring of the coal and steel industries', contained in the Commission aide-mémoire (COM(85) 429 final Doc. C2-83/85),
- having regard to its resolution of 16 April 1985 (1) on:
  - the report of the Court of Auditors on the financial statements at 31 December 1983 of the European Coal and Steel Community, and
  - the report (annexed to the 1983 ECSC Annual Report) of the Court of Auditors on the accounting and financial management in which it considered that the question of the level of reserves was the most important issue arising from the implementation of ECSC resources and instructed its Committee on Budgetary Control to draw up a report on the creation, suitability and level of the ECSC reserves (para. 1).
- having regard to the report of the Committee on Budgetary Control (Doc. A2-155/85),

- 1. Notes that the maintenance of the ECSC's favourable position on the capital market triple-A rating continues to be a high-priority objective; looks forward, therefore, to the Commission's decision to call in an independent firm to examine the question of a suitable level of ECSC reserves:
- 2. Calls on the Commission to submit the findings of this examination to the Committee on Budgetary Control without delay;
- 3. Stresses that the continuing structural crisis in the coal and steel industries urgently calls for social and industrial policy measures in the context of the ECSC and that this presupposes appropriate financial latitude for the ECSC;
- 4. Stresses that, because the European Community's financial resources are being stretched, it is imperative to exploit this latitude as effectively as possible; welcomes therefore the measures announced by the Commission on the reorganization of the system of budgetary management in respect of the appropriations for social measures transferred from the general budget, which are intended to reduce the volume of committed liquid assets;
- 5. Calls on the Commission to submit a realistic calculation of the annual level of expenditure required until the completion of the restructuring measures to finance social measures in connection with the restructuring of the coal and steel industries, to justify such expenditure and to indicate when, in addition to payments already made, Community budget appropriations will become necessary in this regard;
- 6. Calls on the Commission to account for the utilization of all appropriations transferred from the general budget since 1979 as contributions from the Member States or as aids to finance additional social measures in the context of the ECSC, to assess the level of appropriations required in the light of the objectives it has defined, and to submit this assessment to Parliament;
- 7. Expects the Commission to continue to demonstrate to Parliament each year, as part of the budgetary procedure, the appropriateness and necessity of further transfers from the Community's general budget to the ECSC budget;
- 8. Takes the view that, in keeping with the Directives on funding from other Community sources too, the appropriations transferred from the Community's general budget to implement social measures, or any such appropriations transferred in future, must be utilized primarily to promote shop-floor innovation that creates jobs, rather than to refinance compensation programmes in the social field;
- 9. Appreciates the Commission's intention to commit expenditure in future on the basis of a legal commitment only and to cancel immediately commitments that have become superfluous;
- 10. Takes the view that there is an urgent need for a comprehensive assessment of the utilization of ECSC research appropriations, since this might enable the product of such research support measures to be put to better use in the restructuring process and the findings to be made available to a wider market:
- 11. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Commission, the Council, the Court of Auditors, the ESCS Consultative Committee and the administrative authorities in the coal and steel regions.

# 16. Scrutiny by the Member States of the system of financing by the EAGGF

#### RESOLUTION

on the follow-up to the special report of the Court of Auditors on the implementation of Directive 77/435/EEC of 27 June 1977 on scrutiny by the Member States of transactions forming part of the system of financing by the EAGGF (Guarantee Section)

- having regard to its opinion of 9 May 1977 on the initial proposal from the Commission of the European Communities for a Directive on the inspection by Member States of transactions forming part of the system of financing by the EAGGF (Guarantee Section) (1),
- having regard to its Decision of 18 May 1983 to grant discharge to the Commission of the European Communities for the 1981 financial year (2),
- having regard to the special report of the Court of Auditors on the implementation of Directive 77/435/EEC on scrutiny by Member States of transactions forming part of the system of financing by the EAGGF (Guarantee Section) (3),
- having regard to the report of the Committee on Budgetary Control and the opinion of the Committee on Agriculture, Fisheries and Food (Doc. A2-134/85),
- A. Recalling its resolution of 10 April 1984 on frauds against the Community budget (4).
- B. Conscious of the continuing need to protect the Community budget against frauds and irregularities and to make improvements that reflect the lessons learnt from experience,
- C. Concerned that allegations of fraud and irregularities might damage public confidence in the Community and its institutions,
- D. Anxious to ensure that (i) proper control is exercised by Member States of funds expended as part of the system of financing of the EAGGF (Guarantee Section); and (ii) frauds and irregularities in the EAGGF (Guarantee Section) are brought to light and dealt with prompt-
- Notes that Regulation 729/70 (5) on financing of the Common Agricultural Policy and Regulation 283/72 (6) on irregularities and the recovery of sums wrongly paid in connection with the Common Agricultural Policy established the initial responsibility of Member States for ensuring that transactions are executed correctly and for preventing irregularities;
- Recalls that Directive 77/435/EEC (7) was adopted because the scrutiny of commercial documents had been shown to be effective in uncovering irregularities;
- Is concerned, however, that the Directive does not appear to have been consistently implemented in all Member States;
- Considers that better results in uncovering and controlling fraud could be obtained if controls of an accounting nature were complemented by physical and administrative controls;

- 5. Calls upon the Commission to propose a Directive to fix the minimum conditions for physical and administrative controls on expenditure in the EAGGF (Guarantee Section) to be applied by all Member States;
- 6. Insists that the Commission should prepare proposals for financial sanctions against Member States who fail to implement Directive 77/435/EEC on scrutiny of commercial documents properly and consistently;
- 7. Insists that the Commission takes all judicial measures provided for in the Treaties and deriving therefrom against those Member States who do not properly and consistently apply the provisions of Directive 77/435 and, in particular, insists that the Commission holds Member States financially responsible for the consequences of frauds which they do not pursue with the necessary diligence;
- 8. Invites the Commission to ensure that adequate staff are available within the Commission's services for ensuring that the Directive on scrutiny is applied in Member States, if necessary by putting forward proposals for additional staff to work exclusively in this area;
- 9. Calls upon the Commission to take immediate steps to ensure that the Directive is applied to public storage operations;
- 10. Urges the Commission to reiterate to national administrations that transactions involving total receipts and payments from the EAGGF (Guarantee Section) below 100 000 ECU should not be excluded from the controls effected by the Directive;
- 11. Invites the Commission to clarify the objectives of Community legislation for national administrations, to establish a common understanding of the terms fraud and irregularity and to consider whether—the present Regulations and Directives sufficiently delineate the respective responsibilities of Member States and the Commission;
- 12. Invites the Commission, in conjunction with the Member States, to ensure that, where frauds against the Community budget occur, appropriate judicial and administrative proceedings follow, and that the sanctions imposed, including wide publicity for successful prosecutions, are sufficient to deter others who would commit fraud;
- 13. Recalling the resolution on frauds against the Community budget, again asks the Commission to draw up a list of instruments (i) which could be improved, (ii) which should be abolished, and (iii) which are conducive to fraud;
- 14. Urges the Commission to establish a 'flying squad' to coordinate anti-fraud and irregularities work and to carry out unannounced investigative visists;
- 15. Calls upon the Commission to report annually to Parliament's Committee on Budgetary Control on what further steps it has taken to improve the implementation of the Directive on scrutiny;
- 16. Calls upon the Commission to report on progress in relation to the above proposals;
- 17. Expects the Court of Auditors to report on the implementation of the Directive on scrutiny in the context of its Annual Reports and to continue to examine the question of frauds and irregularities in its special reports on sectors covered by the EAGGF;
- 18. Instructs its President to forward this resolution and the report of its Committee to the Council, the Commission and the Court of Auditors.;
