RESOLUTION

OF THE COUNCIL AND OF THE MINISTERS FOR SOCIAL AFFAIRS MEETING WITHIN THE COUNCIL

of 29 September 1989

on combating social exclusion

(89/C 277/01)

THE COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES AND THE MINISTERS FOR SOCIAL AFFAIRS MEETING WITHIN THE COUNCIL,

1. RECALL the efforts already undertaken by the Community and the Member States to combat poverty and to promote the economic and social integration of economically and socially disadvantaged groups of people, demonstrated specifically in the adoption of the third programme to combat poverty.

EMPHASIZE that combating social exclusion may be regarded as an important part of the social dimension of the internal market;

- 2. NOTE that the process of social exclusion is spreading in a number of fields, resulting in many different types of situation affecting various individuals and groups of people in both rural and urban areas;
- 3. NOTE that the reasons for this process lie in structural changes in our societies and that, of these, difficulty of access to the labour market is a particularly decisive factor;
- 4. URGE the need for economic development policies to be accompanied by integration policies of a specific, systematic and coherent nature;
- 5. AFFIRM that the existence of a series of measures guaranteeing adequate aid and resources adapted to the situation of each individual is a fundamental factor in combating social exclusion;
- 6. EMPHASIZE that social exclusion is not simply a matter of inadequate resources, and that combating exclusion also involves access by individuals and families to decent living conditions by means of

measures for social integration and integration into the labour market;

- 7. Accordingly REQUEST the Member States to implement or promote measures to enable everyone to have access to:
 - education, by acquiring proficiency in basic skills,
 - training,
 - employment,
 - housing,
 - community services,
 - medical care;
- 8. POINT in this connection to the effectiveness of coordinated, coherent development policies based on active participation by local and national bodies and by the people involved;
- 9. UNDERTAKE to continue and, as necessary, to step up the efforts undertaken in common as well as those made by each Member State, and to pool their knowledge and assessments of the phenomena of exclusion;
- 10. Consequently CALL ON the Commission:
 - taking account of the studies which exist or are still in progress, to study, together with the Member States, the measures they are taking to combat social exclusion,
 - to report on the measures taken by the Member States and by the Community in the spheres covered by this resolution within three years of its adoption.

CONCLUSIONS

OF THE COUNCIL AND OF THE MINISTERS RESPONSIBLE FOR FAMILY AFFAIRS MEETING WITHIN THE COUNCIL

of 29 September 1989

regarding family policies

(89/C 277/02)

1. The last decades have been marked by profound demographic and socio-economic changes.

No Community country is immune, even if the changes take place with certain time lags and at different rates.

The demographic outlook raises the question of Europe's political, economic and cultural future in the world.

2. In short, the demographic trend is characterized by a lower fertility rate and an increase in life expectancy resulting in an ageing population, which will decline in the long term.

This change in age structure of the population will be accompanied by a change in family structure, a result of the decline in marriage and of the increase in the number of divorces.

The restructuring of the labour market, changes in working conditions and the increase in female employment are the principal factors in this new economic landscape.

3. In view of the impact of these economic and demographic changes on the family, it is important to ask what are the prospects for, and the objectives and methods of, Community action at family level.

The legitimacy of such Community interest is based less on ideological grounds than on the acknowledgement of such objective facts as the economic role of the family, the responsibility of families in bringing up children, the importance of the family as the touchstone for solidarity between generations, the irreversible desire for equality between men and women and the wish of women to have complete access to working life in order to provide the family with a suitable environment in which it can develop harmoniously and in which its members can flourish, with due regard for freedom of choice as to the number of children.

Community action will have to be pragmatic in order to respect the special features of different national policies already created and the varying socioeconomic contexts in which such policies operate.

- 4. In this context, the following activities will be started or continued at Community level:
 - (a) information actions, particularly through the production and presentation of regular information on demography and measures concerning families (household structure, female employment rates, trend in birthrates, etc.), using to that effect the network of experts already set up by the Commission as well as thematic studies;
 - (b) inclusion of the family dimension in the establishment of appropriate Community policies, for example in the freedom of movement of persons and equality between men and women;
 - (c) a regular exchange of information and views at Community level on major themes of common interest as regards family policy and demography, with particular emphasis on:
 - the impact of other Community policies on the family,
 - measures making it possible to implement policies on equal opportunities for men and women, in particular access for women to the labour market,
 - measures in favour of families, including measures tailored to the characteristics or difficulties of some families,

taking account of activities in other international organizations, to avoid any duplication of effort.

- 5. The activities would be monitored by:
 - (a) regular assessment of the measures taken through regular consultation between the Commission and:
- the working party of senior national officials with responsibility for family affairs,
- organizations representing families at Community level on the basis of representative pluralist criteria;
- (b) periodic assessment in the Council.

COUNCIL CONCLUSIONS

of 29 September 1989

on a European card for provision of immediate care

(89/C 277/03)

THE COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES,

Whereas it is important to promote freedom of movement for insured persons by any means capable of simplifying their everyday life when travelling within the Community;

Whereas, to this end, access to the benefits offered by Community provisions on social security should be made easier;

Whereas this objective could be attained, in particular by establishing a harmonized European social insurance card, using media that may change in line with modern administrative techniques;

Whereas in 1983 the Commission considered simplification of the procedures required for provision of health care during a stay abroad;

Whereas, as the first stage, access to treatment required during temporary stays in a Member State other than the competent State could be improved and simplified forthwith by taking existing national social insurance cards into account,

1. REQUESTS the Commission, with the long-term aim of establishing a European card for provision of immediate care, to conduct a survey initially of procedures whereby Member States could recognize national social insurance cards issued by other Member States.

This should enable cardholders staying temporarily in a Member State other than the competent Member State to have access, on the terms laid down by Article 22 (1) (a) of Regulation (EEC) No 1408/71, to urgently needed treatment, on presentation of their national insurance card or form E 111;

2. IS in favour, as of now, of any experiments in mutual recognition of national social insurance cards that Member States may engage in.

CONCLUSIONS

OF THE COUNCIL AND THE MINISTERS FOR EDUCATION MEETING WITHIN THE COUNCIL

of 6 October 1989

on cooperation and Community policy in the field of education in the run-up to 1993

(89/C 277/04)

THE COUNCIL AND THE MINISTERS FOR EDUCATION MEETING WITHIN THE COUNCIL,

education departments and other departments and bodies concerned in each Member State.

Recalling the texts adopted within the Community on educational matters;

After discussing the Commission communication on guidelines for the medium term (1989 to 1992) in the sphere of education and training,

REACHED THE FOLLOWING CONCLUSIONS:

1. In view of the fundamental role that education and training play in the economic, social and cultural development of the States of the Community and in the development of the Community itself,

in view of the consequences of the establishment of the internal market which will affect the educational policies of the Member States and mark a new stage in the Community cooperation initiated in this field by the resolution of 9 February 1976;

2. They believe that the principal objectives of the cooperation which they intend to implement in the next five years should be set, taking account of the Commission's guidelines. These objectives will make it possible to ensure greater continuity and consistency between the various cooperation activities carried out in an intergovernmental and Community framework and to assess these activities regularly in the light of the objectives. This cooperation must take account of the necessary interaction between Community policy and State policies in the field of education and training.

It must be based on two fundamental principles respect for linguistic and cultural diversity and affirmation of the subsidiarity of Community activities and must respect the fundamental powers of the Member States in matters of general education policy.

In view of the ever closer links between initial and continuing training, this cooperation cannot develop unless there is constant collaboration between

- 3. Five objectives shared by the Community Member States can be identified as a basis for future cooperation activities. They will contribute to drawing the States closer together in the field of education and training and thus to bringing about a Europe of knowledge and cultures.
 - A multicultural Europe based on:
 - strengthening young people's sense of belonging to a European community by developing the European dimension in teaching and teacher training,
 - the progressive achievement of genuine multilingualism by promoting foreign-language teaching in school, university and vocationaltraining systems,
 - taking the variety of cultural approaches into account in education and training systems,
 - drawing educational and training establishments closer together in the interest of mutual enrichment and the enhanced integration of children of citizens of the Community Member States, in particular within the school environment, with due regard for their linguistic and cultural identity.

— A mobile Europe ensured by:

- the free movement of persons and ideas, encouraged in particular by the systems for recognition of diplomas and for the equivalence of professional qualifications,
- support for the organization of youth exchanges and for training periods abroad for teachers, instructors, pupils, students and education administrators,
- the introduction of procedures providing teachers with the opportunity to teach temporarily in educational establishments of other Community Member States.

- A Europe of training for all based on:
 - the offer of high-quality education and training to all young people in the Community, which should, in the long term, contribute to reducing regional disparities,
 - the development of appropriate teaching and training for disadvantaged children and of measures to combat failure at school,
 - equality of access to high-quality education.
- A Europe of skills secured by:
 - constantly improving the quality of basic education,
 - providing young people with a better preparation for working life and giving them training which will enable them to adapt to economic, technological, social and cultural developments,
 - developing all the educational sectors which are vital for the future of Europe, in particular technical and vocational training and higher education,
 - adapting the content and methods of training to technological change,

- improving the initial and continuing training of education staff.
- A Europe open to the world, which seeks to:
 - intensify cooperation with international organizations dealing with education and training,
 - strengthen links with other States and evolve new forms of mutual support with developing countries.

The Education Committee is instructed to:

- examine the proposals that the Commission will submit to the Council, in particular on the basis of its communication on medium-term guidelines and in accordance with the principles set out in paragraph 2 above,
- promote exchanges of information on the activities undertaken in the Member States to achieve the objectives adopted, in particular through the organization of regular meetings among those responsible at the political and administrative levels,
- examine other ways of improving procedures currently followed and developing future cooperation in the field of education, having regard to the need for effective management of cooperation activities and value for money, and to the need to recognize the limitations on resources.

CONCLUSIONS

OF THE COUNCIL AND THE MINISTERS MEETING WITHIN THE COUNCIL

of 6 October 1989

on the youth card in Europe

(89/C 277/05)

THE COUNCIL AND THE MINISTERS MEETING WITHIN THE COUNCIL,

ARE AGREED on the benefits of the experiments conducted by those States which have introduced a youth card, contributing to the mobility of young people in Europe;

ENCOURAGE national initiatives, whether or not governmental, enabling young people to benefit from privileges, in particular in culture, sport, travel and accommodation, and encourage the development of existing national systems;

AGREE UPON the need to coordinate national experiments which might eventually lead to a European youth card, the implementing arrangements for which would be determined by each Member State under its national powers.

ACP-EEC LOME CONVENTION 10th ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ACP-EEC COUNCIL OF MINISTERS (1986)

The ACP—EEC Council of Ministers, on which, under the third ACP—EEC Convention, 66 African, Caribbean and Pacific States and the Community and its 12 Member States are represented, has just adopted its tenth periodical report and ordered its publication.

The report covers activities in 1986 in the context of the implementation of the third ACP-EEC Convention.

This Student Handbook has been prepared, for the assistance of students and their advisers, to bring together in all Community languages the basic information needed by those considering a period of higher education in another Member State.

The Handbook contains an entry for each of the Member States of the Community. Each entry consists of two main sections, a descriptive text and annexes. The text gives general information on the structure of the higher education system, its institutions and the types of qualifications obtainable, on admission conditions and application procedures, and on fees, language requirements, and grants, as well as an indication of important social elements such as social security, counselling, accommodation, etc. The annexes to each country entry contain a list of addresses of organizations and institutions from which further information and/or application forms may be obtained, a bibliography of national information material, in most cases a table of subjects taught at each institution, and a glossary per national entry for the explanation of terms that have not been translated. Special provisions of the universities to facilitate study for disabled students are mentioned in the text and in some of the tables.

In addition to the national entries, the Handbook contains separate entries for the College of Europe at Bruges and the European University Institute at Florence.

Furthermore, the Handbook gives information in a special chapter on the cooperation of universities in the framework of the newly created Erasmus programme of the EC. All higher education projects accepted into the programme during the first selection round 1987/88 are listed, broken down by subject areas.

The last chapter gives a survey of Naric, the network of national information centres for the recognition of diplomas, certificates and periods of study which is being coordinated and supported by the Commission.

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
