Proposal for a Council Directive on sweeteners for use in foodstuffs

COM(90) 381 final - SYN 296

(Submitted by the Commission on 18 September 1990)

THE COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES,

Having regard to the Treaty establishing the European Economic Community, and in particular Article 100a thereof,

Having regard to the proposal from the Commission,

In cooperation with the European Parliament,

Having regard to the opinion of the Economic and Social Committee,

Having regard to Council Directive 89/107/EEC of 21 December 1988 on the approximation of the laws of the Member States concerning food additives authorized for use in foodstuffs intended for human consumption (1), and in particular Article 3 (2) thereof,

After consultation of the Scientific Committee for Food,

Whereas, differences between national laws relating to sweeteners and their conditions of use hinder the free movement of foodstuffs; whereas this situation may create conditions of unfair competition;

Whereas the prime consideration for any rules on sweeteners and their conditions of use should be the need to protect the consumer;

Whereas, having regard to the most recent scientific and toxicological information, these substances are to be permitted only for certain foodstuffs and under certain conditions of use;

Whereas this Directive is not intended to affect rules relating to functions other than the sweetening properties of the substances covered by this Directive;

Whereas the Commission is to adapt Community provisions to bring them into line with the rules laid down in this Directive;

Whereas the use of sweeteners to replace sugar is justified for the production of energy-reduced or sugar-free food and in some cases where the replacement of sugar extends the shelf life,

HAS ADOPTED THIS DIRECTIVE:

Article 1

- 1. This Directive is a specific directive forming a part of the comprehensive directive within the meaning of Article 3 of Directive 89/107/EEC.
- 2. This Directive shall apply to food additives which are used to impart a sweet taste to foodstuffs, hereinafter referred to as 'sweeteners'.
- 3. This Directive shall not apply to foodstuffs with sweetening properties such as mono-, disaccharides and honey.

Article 2

- 1. Only sweeteners listed in the Annex may be used in foodstuffs.
- 2. Sweeteners may only be used in those foodstuffs listed in the Annex under the conditions specified therein.

- 3. Sweeteners may not be used in foods intended for particular nutritional use by infants and young children, except where specially provided for.
- 4. Maximum levels indicated in the Annex refer to the ready-for-consumption foodstuffs prepared according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Article 3

This Directive shall apply without prejudice to specific directives permitting additives listed in the Annex to be used for functions other than sweetening.

Article 4

Where necessary, it may be decided by the procedure laid down in Article 6 of this Directive, whether a particular foodstuff belongs to a category of foods mentioned in Article 2 (3) and foodstuffs listed in the Annex.

Article 5

Any provision necessary to adapt existing Community provisions to the rules laid down in this Directive shall be adopted within six months of its notification according to the procedure laid down in Article 6 of this Directive.

Article 6

Where the procedure laid down in this Article is to be followed, the matter shall be referred to the Standing Committee on Foodstuffs (hereinafter referred to as the 'Committee') by the chairman on his own initiative or at the request of the representative of a Member State.

The representative of the Commission shall submit to the Committee a draft of the measures to be taken. The Committee shall deliver its opinion on the draft, within a time limit which the chairman may lay down according to the urgency of the matter, if necessary by taking a vote.

The opinion shall be recorded in the minutes; in addition, each Member State shall have the right to ask to have its position recorded in the minutes.

The Commission shall take the utmost account of the opinion delivered by the Committee. It shall inform the Committee of the manner in which its opinion has been taken into account.

Article 7

Member States shall bring into force the laws, regulations and administrative provisions necessary to comply with this Directive not later than April 30, 1992 in order to:

- allow trade in and use of products conforming to this Directive no later than April 30, 1992,
- prohibit trade in and use of products not conforming to this Directive no later than April 30, 1993.

They shall inform the Commission thereof.

These provisions shall make express reference to this Directive.

Article 8

This Directive is addressed to Member States.

THE COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES,

Having regard to the Treaty establishing the European Economic Community, and in particular Article 235 thereof,

Having regard to the proposal from the Commission,

Having regard to the opinion of the European Parliament,

Whereas the European Council of 28 April 1990 agreed that action within the framework of the G-24 should be extended to the other Central and East European countries:

Whereas the Ministers of the G-24 in their meeting on 4 July 1990 welcomed the Commission's action plan, which envisages, among others, loans from the European Investment Bank;

Whereas the arrangements set out in Council Decision 90/62/EEC (1) for finance by the European Investment Bank for projects in Poland and Hungary should be extended to include projects, notably in the field of

infrastructure, to be carried out in the Czech and Slovak Federal Republic, Bulgaria and Rumania,

Whereas the Council has invited the Bank, and the Bank has agreed, to make available loans for projects in the Czech and Slovak Federal Republic and Bulgaria under the guarantee provided in this Decision;

Whereas the Council will invite the Bank to provide loans in Rumania when the political and economic conditions in this country so permit,

HAS DECIDED AS FOLLOWS:

Sole Article

Decision 90/62/EEC is hereby amended as follows:

- all references to 'Hungary and Poland' are henceforth to 'Hungary, Poland, the Czech and Slovak Federal Republic, Bulgaria and Rumania',
- all references to 'the two countries' are henceforth to 'the five countries'.

The Commission of the European Communities, Directorate-General for the Internal Market and Industrial Affaairs, is planning to conclude contracts for services, consultancy or studies in connection with its programme for opening up the internal market in public procurement.

Work to be carried out relates to public procurement, and in particular to the following general subjects:

- 4. Statistical development in the field of public procurement. This includes statistical techniques for generating a flow of statistics, and for creating and managing a data base.
- 5. Assessment of the possibilities of developing subcontracting as a means of helping the less-favoured regions to participate more fully in public procurement.

 - (a) level of participation by SMEs in relation to the value of contracts awarded;
 - (b) development and efficiency of information systems aimed at improving access by SMEs to the public procurement market;
 - (c) general problems encountered by SMEs when tendering for contracts, in the areas of:

- (i) qualification conditions;
- (ii) financial guarantees;
- (iii) administrative procedures;
- (iv) legal and practical aspects, possible action;
- (d) problems encountered by SMEs when tendering for large contracts; possible role, including harmonization of legal frameworks, of:
 - (a) various forms of association or cooperation;
 - (b) division into lots;
 - (c) subcontracting;
- (e) appropriate measures at regional level.

The Commission invites interested parties with suitable experience and capacity and who may be interested in bidding for contracts in any or all of these fields to express their interest in accordance with the following procedure. Only those who express interest and pass the pre-selection will be invited to bid.
